YOUNG BUT VICIOUS HOLD-UP ARRESTED

L. J. Markham, Paroled Inmate of Minnesota Reformatory, Robs Chinese Restaurant.

OGDEN, Nov. 2.—A young man, giving his name as L. J. Markham, was arrested Tuesday morning on the charge of having held up a Chinese food house Monday night about 12 o'clock and taking from the proprietor \$8 in silver. Markham stated that he was from Minnesota, being out on parole from the state reformatory, and that he had been living in Ogden for some months in the employ of a tailor on Twenty-fifth street. Monday night he went out to turn a few tough tricks and was successful in his venture, until the city detective got on his trail. The young man, who is about 19 or 20 years of age, seems to be possessed of a great many dime novel ideas and in confessing his crime, stated that he was sorry he did not kill the Chinaman so that the latter could not testify against him. The police have notified the authorities of the Minnesota reformatory of the arrest and in the meantime he will be held on the charge of robbery.

OGDEN FORESTRY BUILDING.

OGDEN, Nov. 2.—Forester Clyde Leavitt states that the government has given notice of cancellation of the lease on the upper floors of the First national bank building, to take effect Dec. 1. This means that the new forestry service building being erected on the corner of Twenty-fourth street and Lincoln avenue will be completed by that date, notwithstanding the fact that it has been generally understood that it would not be completed until the first of the year. The contractors are doing everything in their power to have things in shape to turn over to

the forestry people on time. Mr. Leavitt and his associates are very anxious to move into their own quarters and it is understood that the local building is one of the finest in the country devoted to the use of the Agricultural department.

DEPOT IMPROVEMENTS.

OGDEN, Nov. 2.—The work on the new passenger tracks at the west of the Union depot is being rushed with all possible speed and the old "T" which has been used for about 20 years has been removed. Fully 300 men are at work in the local yards, laying cement between the tracks, installing new tracks and making other improvements.

WILL PLANT SUFFRAGIST FLAG ON PIKE'S PEAK

Denver, Colo., Nov. 2.—Mrs. Helen Lavelle Baker of Spokane, Wash., arrived here yesterday on her way to Manitou and the summit of Pike's Peak where she will plant an equal suffrage flag, which she brought from England. Mrs. Baker is one of the wealthiest women in the west, the largest taxpayer in Washington and an ardent suffragist. She has engaged a special train on the Pike's Peak road, which had closed for the season, to make the ascent of the peak Friday. The flag she will place at the top

of the peak bears the inscription, "Vote for Women," in black letters. Mrs. Baker represented the north-west as delegate to the international suffrage convention held in London last summer.

MYSTERY OF MANY BANK ROBBERIES CLEARED UP

Nuskogee, Okla., Nov. 2.—By the confession of Edward Coleman, under arrest here on the charge of aiding to rob the Frisco depot of \$2,000 here last January, mysteries surrounding the robbery of several banks in Oklahoma, Arkansas, Missouri and Kansas have been cleared. Coleman has given the district attorney the names of a gang which the robber says has operated in the southwest for several years. He names "Billy" Mayer, now in jail at St. Louis, on the charge of robbing the Wellville, Mo., bank as one of the ring-leaders. Another member, he says, is Arthur Greenweight, 18 years old, of Rolla, Mo. Greenweight says he was kidnapped by the gang and forced to do their bidding.

RESCUED FROM DEATH ON NEVADA DESERT

Los Angeles, Nov. 2.—According to a letter received in this city from Los Angeles, Cal., Albert Balha, a former Los Angeles druggist, has been rescued from death on the Nevada desert after wandering five days, suffering and demoralized, and subsisting upon the flesh of snakes and lizards and water obtained from the cactus plant.

Balha left Los Angeles, Oct. 29 for Sand Tanks, on the trail to the Lee district. He was accompanied by Jack Lamplade. They ran out of water and Balha being unable to go further, Lamplade pushed ahead and reached Lee. He returned with a searching party and Balha was found after several days' search within a mile of where his companions had left him.

Balha was on his hands and knees, laughing gleefully and trying to catch an elusive little lizard no longer than a penny nail. A few drops of water at frequent intervals partially revived him. While suffering from a severe fever attack, he will recover.
