

CITY COUNCIL GRIND.

Stallman and Estes Went to Build a Street Railroad to the Copper Plant.

ELECTRIC AND GAS FRANCHISES.

The City Pays the County \$7,212.50 and thus Ends the Seven Years' Litigation Dispute.

The City Council met in regular session last night. In the absence of President Louisaouen, Moran was called to the chair. The following members responded to roll call: Heaton, Lawson, Beauford, Simons, Evans, Kelley, Horn, Hardy, Fifehead.

THE PROCESSION.

Frank Hartigan read a communication with reference to the thirty days extension granted by the Council to the Metropolitan Glass Company, in which to submit bills for paving sidewalks on certain streets, and reported that the thirty days had expired and said that he was anxious to close up his contract at his own expense.

Even Moran asked to have the gravel beds on the main beach, saying he would pay seven cents for each load taken therefrom. Committee on public grounds.

Francis Beauford asked that the sum of \$10,250 paid by him for services to be reduced, as he had all his own work by permission of the Council, Board of public works.

Milner & Miller, real estate brokers, sent a communication in which they stated they wished to erect a dwelling on a part of lot 4, block 20, just E. of Main street and the east end of the said block the Jordan and T. L. C. Company had already allotted to them. Therefore they asked permission to change the course of the canal at their own expense. Committee on public grounds.

W. F. Williams offered to lease his land and premises belonging to the city and city 41 for \$100 per month, subject to Committee on public grounds.

J. Briess and others represented that they had paid water tax for laying pipes on paved avenues, and asked for the privilege of continuing the general water system by service pipe, or that a main be laid on Lincoln avenue. Committee on waterworks.

Lemard Littleton and thirty-two others offered the same plan of waterworks on Main Street, instead of addition. Committee on waterworks.

Hallman & Bates asked for a franchise to construct a street railway, beginning at the Warm Springs, to the west line of Kinney's Copper Plant, and extending from the west line of section of Third West and Fourth North streets to the intersection of Ninth West and Ninth North, with the usual proviso. They also asked that immediate action be taken to the present condition of the water system between the center of the city and the copper works, as entirely inadequate. Committee on municipal laws when the city attorney associated.

The superintendent of sewers reported that the original franchises granted did not cover the power for the operation of the new pump and that the pump was now shut down. Committee on sewers with instruction to report at Tuesday night's meeting of the Council.

A. S. Giddens and others protested against street sprinkling on First Street, between Third and Fourth West streets. Committee on sprinkling.

Mr. Harrigan's petition laid on the table earlier in the evening was again taken up and referred to the board of public works.

ROLL CALLING.

Councilman Bell, who just returned from a business trip to Montana entered the council chamber at this juncture of the proceedings and took his seat.

GRESH STREET WATERMEN.

The committee on waterworks recommended that the petition of John Alcock be dismissed, as it was filed on October 1, asking that watermen be allowed to collect and measure the collector and passerby be authorized to collect the balance of the assessment, and when such collection is made, that the superintendent of waterworks be authorized to lay the main line on street.

George H. Carney represented that he had a quarry a short distance beyond the Warm Springs, containing thousands of tons of crushed quartzite which he offered to sell to the city for one centroyd^{per ton} per load. Committee on streets.

CHARLES WATERS LIGHT.

The city recorder reporting in the matter of the petition of James D. Morris, asking for extension of sewer tax. We are sorry to report that Morris is Fifth South street, state that he could not publish the notice of intention until he was reformed so

RECENTLY ARRIVED.

City Engineers furnished an estimate of the cost of a sewer on the main south side of Main Street, between South Temple and First South streets, the same being \$100,000, or \$10 per foot of running property. A committee recommended that the Deseret and Commercial company be allowed to charge their main and reservoirs taxes 9, 4 and 5, near the Hot Springs. Adopted.
