Washington, May 26.—The seal fisheries master was considered by the cabinet meeting today at length, but no conclusion reached. Secretary Seward, Mr. Atkinson and Assistant Secretary of State, Mr. Adams, were present, and with the President, nowhere, with the view of determining a plan of action.

The President only approves the necessity of prompt action in the matter, and it is his opinion that it is better to let the matter drag on than to bring about a conclusion so far as the fisheries master was concerned.
