Navy Department Abandons Plan to Transform it Into a Mine Ship. Washington. May 28.--The navy de-partment has been obliged to abandou its plan to transform the cruiser Sau Francisco into a mine ship because the partmen Francisco into a mine ship because the change will involve the expenditure of more than \$200,000 and it would re-quire a congressional appropriation. The San Francisco is now at Norfolk, where the work was to have been un-dertaken. The plan was to equip this ship with a plant capable of handling rapidly and with reasonable safety what are known as floating and sub-merged mines, such as were used with great effect during the Russo-Japanese war. A properly equipped mine ship can place these elements of coast dowar. A properly equipped mine ship can place these elements of coast de-fense in any ordinary harbor in suffi-cient numbers to insure protection in a course of a day or two, whereas many days and even weeks would be consumed by an ordinary vessel in the accompalishment of the same amount of work.

The conversion of the cruiser Baltimore, now at New York, into a mine ship is also temporarily suspended for similar reasons.
