SUIT AGAINST THE KIMBERLY ESTATE

Sensational Charges Made by the Great Western Gold Mining Company of California.

CONSPIRACY IS ALLEGED.

Looked Upon as a Scheme of Black-mail—Plaintiffs Had Option on Balakilla Mine.

Chicago, June 8.—The Great Western Gold Mining company of California with headquarters at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, has brought suit against the estate of the late Peter L. Kimberly, the millionaire, who died suddenly in this city last Sunday morning.

In the declaration the assertion is made that by entering into a conspiracy with former officers of the gold company Kimberly sold to the Great Western company for \$2,000,000 property worth not more than \$500,000.

Beside the suit against Kimberly's estate the gold company has sued W. P. Snyder, of Salt Lake City, who is alleged in the bill to have made the arrangements between Kimberly and the officers of the company.

Everyone who was intimately acquainted with Mr. Kimberly, and reads the foregoing, cannot believe that the filing of this suit was designed for any other purpose than that of blackmail, and now that the dead mining man is not here to make his own defense, those instrumental in bringing the action are taking advantage of the opportunity to benefit his name in hopes of getting a portion of the \$10,000,000 worth of property which the mining man bequeathed to his estate.

While Mr. Kimberly was shrewd in his business transactions, he was always considered to be honorable; he was a man of high ideals and endeavored to conduct his affairs as an honest, substantial business man should do.

At the offices of the Western Exploration company, which was the agent for the Kimberly estate, Mr. Kimberly was extensively interested in a little indignation was expressed today at the attempt being made to bring disgrace upon the name of the dead mining titan. The affair was characterized as being a scheme of blackmail of the worst form.

According to Secretary Charles E. Inwood, Mr. Kimberly not only of his associates ever received a cent from the plaintiff in this action or anyone connected with it.

The fact is, the parties connected with the promotion of this concern were given a call on the Balakilla mine in the Shasta country, Cal., in December, 1902, but afterwards, on investigation by Mr. Kimberly, it was ascertained the parties had no standing, financially, morally or otherwise, and Mr. Kimberly advised his local representatives with instructions to cease negotiations.

The Balakilla mine was retitled and developed by the Western Exploration company and is now about to be fitted out with a smelter of large capacity. It is claimed that one of the dead mining man's associates, who had been blocked out since negotiations with the Great Western company, who now see where they lost an opportunity to not exercising their option promptly nearly three years ago.

TRADING SOME BETTER.

The Prices of Mining Stocks, However Continue Weak.

Trading was a little better on the mining stock exchange today, but the range of prices was not very much improved, if at all.

Carroll was the first sale of the day, which was marked up with a decline of a cent a share. Mammoth closed next with a board lot going at \$12.50. May Day kept above 13 cents, but passed the calls practically where it was being bought for several days. Silver shield weakened in spite of the efforts to hold it up, while New York was marked down again to 57 1/2 cents. The closing quotations and sales were reported as follows:

WILD IRISH AND AMETHYST DEAL.

All Papers Have Been Signed and Deer Lodge Property is Now In New Hands.

SECOND PAYMENT ON JUMBO.

Rich Silver Ore Found in Inter-Ocean Mine—Assays Run as High As 258 Ounces.

Fay, Nevada, June 7.—All the papers have been signed up in the Wild Irish-Amethyst deal and in a short time work will commence. The Hollinger and Francis boys were up yesterday from Eagle valley and closed up their deal. With the passing out of their hands of this property, they have no further interests in Pike Diamonds, having sold their Jumbo mine to James W. Johnston of Salt Lake. Mr. Johnston recently made his second payment for the mine, and it is said, will soon have a strong company organized to take over the group.

A rich silver strike has been made at Deer Lodge by Phil Beck and Clark Miller in the Old Inter Ocean mine. Over 200 feet of tunneling had been done by parties who formerly owned the mine, but they failed to discover that they had passed through the values they were in search of. Miller and Beck located the group in January last, and in prospecting it ran across the big find. The mine runs 258 ounces in silver, and looks like ordinary red porphyry. An examination with a glass shows it to be liberally permeated with horn silver. The strike, like all others, has put the owners of adjoining properties to work and all are satisfied that they too, will soon have the rich ore. Silver assays have been secured from the Gold Bug, to the north of the Inter Ocean, running over 200 ounces, and a long tunnel is being run to catch the shoot. The Morning group lying south of the Inter Ocean is being prospectively now for the source of some rich gold and silver float found there.

A good strike is also reported from the Inter Ocean. The Silver King mine has been charged of the property and has opened up about 100 feet of a ledge, four feet wide, of ore running close to the 400 mark in gold. This mine adjoins the O'Brien and Johnny, and is in the right locality to make a big thing. A shipment is now being taken out for the Salt Lake smelters, and it is the intention of Mr. Monahan to continue to ship such ore as he takes out in developing the mine.

DELMAR SLIMES PLANT.

Supt. Swindler in City to Look After Matters Pertaining to It.

Supt. Frank P. Swindler of the Delmar Slimes plant, Delamar, E. Nevada, is in the city from camp again to look after matters concerning the erection of the new slimes plant at that place. The preliminary work is well advanced and Supt. Swindler expects to have the plant in commission early in the fall.

While responding as well as it did during the months of April and May, with every indication that the good record of those months will be maintained.

John M. Donahoe of Butte, a brother of the Butte mine, is in the city, and a director in the Carbonate Hill mine in Morgan county is in town between trains on his way to Omaha.

E. W. Clark, manager of the capital Hill mine, and representing Senator W. A. Clark of Montana, is looking over the Nevada gold camps. He was in Delamar and Bullfrog districts last week.

The Cactus club, which was built for the comfort of the employees of the Newhouse Mines and Placerville corporation at Newhouse, Denver county, at a cost of about \$100,000, was formally opened last night.

W. A. Donahoe, who returned a few days from Thunder Mountain, where he was going very slowly, owing to the cold nights and frequent storms. As a consequence the roads are in bad condition and it will be some time before teams can move over the peaks with any freedom.—Boise Statesman.

Information brought to the city by E. J. Erwin and W. J. Turner is to the effect that a great strike of iron ore has been made in the vicinity of Trinity lake in the Alberta section. The man making the discovery sent a lot of the ore to his brother in Pennsylvania, with some description of the property and a statement of the amount of the ore. The brother sent it to Charles D. Walcott, director of the geological survey, and the latter informed him it was molybdenum, and that if the ore existed in any such quantity as represented the prospect one of very great value.—Boise Statesman.
