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London, April 27 .- Jack Johnson, the colored heavyweight pugllist, accompanied by his manager, Fltzpatrick, arrived here from New York this evening. They immediately visited the National Sporting club and the sporting newspapers and issued a challenge to Tommy Burns, the heavyweight champion, to fight anywhere for any purse acceptable to Burns. Johnson went further than this and offered to bet Burns \$2,500 that he will stop him in 20 rounds. In addition he will concede to Burns two-thirds of any purse that is put up for the contest. These terms cannot be published in England as the law of the country prohibits anything but boxing contry promotes anything but boxing con-tests limited to 20 rounds. Burns has been holding out in the negotiation for the Johnson contest, for a sum, win, lose or draw, larger than any syndi-cate has yet appeared willing to offer. Johnson appears anxiosu to meet Burns, but there has been so much cross-firing that it seems doubtful if the two men can come together in the two men can come together in England.
