The National Net.
WASHINGTON, 22.—The attorney
for the Lumber Silver Mining
Company this morning, made ap-
plication to the Supreme Court of
the district for a mandamus on the
Secretary of State to compel him to
pay that company \$4,885.87, the
proportion claimed by them of \$500,
000 recently paid by Mexico on ac-
count of awards made by the Mexi-
can Claims Commission. A rule
was issued to the Secretary to show
cause, made returnable Nov. 25.

Since November 1st there has
been \$19,278,700 in three and a half
percent bonds received at the Treas-
ury for conversion into three per
cent.

The President remained at the
cottage to-day preparing his mes-

The annual report of Fourth Au-
ditor Beardsley shows that the ag-
gregate payments on account of the
navy for the fiscal year ending June
30, 1882, were a little less than the
aggregate of the appropriation made
by Congress. The balance amounting
to more than \$15,000,000 were
made without loss. The appropri-
ation of Congress for the entertain-
ment of this board of visitors at the
Naval Academy is pronounced un-
wise, and a bill of items is given as
an illustration, it having been made
at the last meeting of the board.

Some of the expenditures were:
"Barber, \$15; expense cards,
\$4; umbrellas, \$39; glass, \$3; flowers,
\$13; china, \$20; newspapers, \$4; ice,
\$23; fruit, \$32; ice cream and cake,
\$13; witness, \$100; and other items,
\$538; cigars, \$25; and other arti-
cles given in detail making a total
of \$2,180. The remainder of the
\$5,000 appropriation was expended
for want of money for the im-
provement of the civil service in
the Departments in Washington.

At the afternoon session of the
Judicial Court, a number of ques-
tions prepared by Dr. Collins, brother
of J. J. Collins, scientist of the
Jennette party, were read, but
most of them were ruled out, and in
answer to one regarding the dispo-
sition of articles on the body of Collins,
he replied that Ninderman asked
