MARKET OPENED STRONG.

Pacific Troubles Were Settled.

Enormous Transactions in Pacifics-Election in Cincinnati Strengthened Southwesterns.

Wall Street, New York, Nov. 6 .- The market opened strong under the influence of reports that an agreement had been reached for a settlement of the Northern Pacific trouble. There were 12,000 shares of Union Pacific sold at 1051/2 to 106%, compared with 103% at the close on Monday. The stock had advanced 3% in London over Monday's quotation before the opening here. Southern Pacific was up 118. Enormous blocks of Union Pacific convertible bonds were taken at an ex-

treme advance of 21%. In the general list the changes were fractional, with gains largely predominating. Large blocks of People's Gas were un-

onded, driving it down 2 points to 99. This selling caused realizations elsewhere and some of the leaders dipped sharply, Union Pacific reacting 11/2. Metropolitan Street Railway made a strong rally to 155% and then dropped 2%. Hefore 11 o'clock there was a merked turn upward under the leader-ship of Missouri Pacific. Atchison and ireat Northern preferred rose over a point each, but the Grangers, South-ern Pacific, Union Pacific and the specialties did not recover to the best.
