## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Farewell This Evening**—Elder John W. Johnson will be given a farewell this evening, in the Fifteenth ward meetinghouse, prior to his departure on a mission to Sweden.

**To Assist Unfortunate**—The Young Women's Christian association has opened its new home, 255 Second East street, and started an employment bureau to help girls and women secure situations. The management finds a demand for clerks, stenographers, cooks, housemaids, and women to work by the day.

**Salt Holding Out**—The Warm Springs and Union Foundry (from) companies have taken their striking help back at \$2.75 per day and recognition of the demand of the employers being for \$4 per day, and a closed shop. The Silver Bros. Salt Lake Engineering Works and Davis & Howe are still holding out.

**Col. Young's Lecture**—Col. Willard Young lectured before the Engineering society of the State University yesterday afternoon. He contrasted the sea level and lock plans, the former costing \$266,000,000 as against \$12,000,000 for the latter. The canal will be 150 feet wide except in the mountains, with 35 feet depth of water. The lecturer illustrated his points by fine charts.

**Miss Nelson Home**—Miss Esther Nelson, assistant librarian at State University, will resume her work here in September, after two years of study at Albany, N. Y., in library work, and has pursued a course of study in library science at the University of California. Miss Nelson's position temporarily at the State University, will become L. D. S. university librarian in the fall.

**Coming to Salt Lake**—L. J. Haddock has sold an interest in the Citizens' Electric Supply store to Mr. J. B. Puckett and will soon take the management of the wholesale department of the Inter-Mountain Electrical company, a corporation recently formed in the city by the brick inland sea, with a capital of \$60,000. Mr. Haddock has an interest in the new concern and will prove to be the right man for the department over which he will have charge. While Pocatello people will regret the loss of Mr. Haddock and family, still they will rejoice that he has gained another round on the ladder of fortune and all wish him the best of luck in his new venture.—Pocatello Tribune.

## YOUNG DUNCAN DIES.

His Attempt to Commit Suicide Was Finally Successful.

The attempt to commit suicide made yesterday morning by Gale Duncan, a youth of 29 years, who resided at 103 Blaine avenue, was finally successful, the young man expiring suddenly yesterday afternoon, after he had apparently recovered.

Dr. Chas. W. Stewart, who was called, worked constantly with the boy until after 2 o'clock and had concluded that he was full recovered. The boy rose from his bed, dressed, and went out doors. Here, while sitting on the lawn, he suddenly expired, it is thought from heart failure.

The body was turned over to Eber W. Hall, who prepared it for burial, but the funeral arrangements were postponed pending the receipt of word from a married sister at Roseman, Mont.

# EMERSON SCHOOL ANNUAL EXHIBIT.

In Decorated Building Handiwork  
Of Children Much in  
Evidence.

## PRACTICAL IMPROVEMENT.

Exercises Drew Large Audience—Excellent Musical Program Rendered And Speeches Were Made.

The annual exhibit and exercises of the Emerson school were given yesterday afternoon. The building was decorated with flags and flowers, and the handiwork of the children was very much in evidence. The first grade pupils showed free hand cutting, drawing and doll dressing, the dolls being dressed to represent the pilgrim fathers, Indians, Esquimaux, etc., as an approach to geographical and further ethnological study. The second grade showed practical study of the environment of Robinson Crusoe, with the developments in agriculture as noted in the story. The third grade presented nature work and study in considerable variety; also language work of marked excellence. The fourth graders showed physical geography with map making, the coal mining industry (very good), and a good spelling contest. The fifth grade exhibited profile maps in salt and flour, excellent drawing and coloring, with wall paper patterns, pen and ink sketches, etc. The sixth grade showed musical compositions, drawing and English composition. The seventh grade gave a grammatical exhibit of much worth, drawing and coloring of flags, and hygienic map making and modeling. The eighth grade presented grammar, arithmetic and allied studies that made an excellent display. The manual training department gave an interesting exhibit. The boys showed seats, racks, tables, ironing boards, and many other useful things, the work coming from the fifth to the eighth grades inclusive. The sewing exhibit was one of unusual excellence, showing all grades of work, darning, patching, up to the making of fine underwear.

The exercises were held last evening, and drew a large attendance, with addresses from Superintendent Christensen of the city schools, Professor Stewart of the state university, and Supervisor Parratt of manual training. The program also included a violin solo by Rube McDonald, and a duo from Misses Winifred and Gilette Hill, eighth grade. The work of the children was much admired, and it was readily noted that marked improvement had been made since the last exhibition along the practical lines of life.
