DEATH OF YOUNG WOMAN.

Charles Gall Arrested for Beating and Kicking Victim of Heart Trouble.

Milford, Beaver Co., Aug. 31.—Marie Holmes, a young sporting woman, died here today under suspicious circum-stances. The direct cause of death was heart trouble, but the girl stated that Charles Gall, a saloonkeeper, beat and kicked her last Friday night, and it is to determine whether these injuries were a contributory cause of death that an inquest will be held. Gall was at Callentes, arranging to start a saloon, when notified of the girl's death and immediately started for Milford and was placed under arrest when he reach-ed Modena. He was greatly shocked and deeply affected, and protested his and deeply affected, and protested his innocence with tears in his eyes. He declared that he was greatly attached to the girl and had never assaulted her. A dispute arose over the disappearance of his watch last Friday night and he says he slapped her, but inflicted no in-jury. He exhibits a letter written to him by the girl on Saturday, in which she makes no mention of the alleged assault. The dead girl's true name was Katle Warner and her home was in Denver. It is stated that she had been leading a fast life but a short time and that she was formerly employed at Walker's store.

SERIOUS MINE ACCIDENT. John Malvey Badly Hurt-Death ot Mrs.
