

Round Boats on the Nile.

Soon after leaving Sarras we understood why round-built boats are preferred to long ones. A swirling eddy drifted us against a rock with velocity enough to have smashed an ordinary civilized vessel, but ours merely bobbed round to the blow with no further damage done than to upset, heels up in the air, the half-dozen unwary Egyptian soldiers who are our fellow passengers. There are no awnings overcian soldiers who are our fellow passengers. There are no awnings overhead, so we have to sit in the sun, and for beds at night have the bags of biscuit which form our cargo. The Nile in these parts, silent and easy flowing as it seems from the banks, is an uncanny-looking stream enough to be embarked upon. What looked like mere ripples from the shore are discovered to be veritable whirlpools, and then there are black, ugly rocks that peep up from the water, and past which the current switches viciously. Should the wind suddenly fail we might drift on these dangers too rapidly even for this stout-built craft to resist.

If one of the English boats comes to grief, her passengers will have slender chance, I fear, of reaching the shore. The other day, three blue ackets who were upset in the river disappeared almost immediately, and two of them were strong swimmers. So we must hope that when the expedition really gets afloat the utmost care in navigation will be exercised.—London Times.

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
