WANT COLORADO WATERS.

WANT COLORADO WATERS. Denver, Jan 28.—The larger portion of the waters of Suminit county and a portion of the waters of Clear Creek and Jefferson counties have been filed upon in the state engineer's office by W. E. Goldsborough and Guorge J. Bancroft. The waters will be used in a large reclamation project which will irrighte 200.060 acres of land in the val-ley of the South Platte. The filings in the state engineer's office call for the use of 2.160 second-feet of the waters of Summit county. The reclamation ditch will be 60 miles long and will connect with the Collier mountain tuo-nel. Five reservoirs will be hult.
