Sec. 1.—Be it ordnined by the Gity Council of Salt Lake City, that part of Lot three, Block thirty-eight Plot "A" Salt Lake City survey, situate metheing on the south side of the public grounds known as "Washington Equare," in the First Municipal Ward, be and the same is hereby designated as the City Es-tray Pound, for impounding mitmals

Sec. 12.—Any person taking his own animal or that of any other person out of the custody of a person holding the same for damages done by it, or out of the City Found by stealth, or by force, or shall inter-

rupt or hinder any one while in the discharge of his duty, under the pro-visions of this ordinance, shall be liable to a fine in any sum not exceeding ninety-nine dollars, or imprisonment not to exceed ninety 8775. Fasy payments. First Ward, nar days, or both fine and imprison-

ment. Sec. 13.—Any person who shall maliciously or mischlevously secrete or impound the animal of another, or who shall maliciously or mis-chievously aid and abet therein, shall, on conviction, be liable to a

fine in any sum not less than ten DUNFORD'S dollars or exceeding twenty-five dollars for each offense. Sec. 14.—The Poundkeeper's fces for impounding, registering and posting up notice, shall not exceed one dollar per head for horses, mules

or cattle, nor twenty-five cents for calves, goats, sheep and swine. Fees for feeding animals shall be govern-

ed by the price of forage in the City Market at the time of feeding the same. Fees for advertising shall not exceed a reasonable compensation therefor. All said fees shall be re-

tained by the Poundkeeper for his compensation and the payment of all costs that may have accrued.
