

## SHOT IN MISTAKE FOR A BURGLAR.

Paul Graff, One of the Best Known  
Young Men in the Cœur  
d'Alenes.

## WAS IN HIS UNCLE'S BREWERY.

Nightwatchman Saw Him and a Com-  
panion; Ordered Them to Throw  
Up Their Hands and Fired.

Wallace, Idaho, Oct. 10.—Paul Graff, one of the best known young men in the Cœur d'Alenes, was shot through the stomach and probably mortally wounded at 1:30 this morning while in the office of the Sunset brewery, the property of his uncle.

James Murphy, the night watchman, and engineer, did the shooting through a window, not recognizing the young man and suspecting burglars were at work, as there was another man with young Graff. What business Graff had in the brewery office is not known as he was not in the employ of the brewery. Graff is unconscious and his side of the shooting may never be known. Murphy, who fired the shot, says: "I heard a noise in the brewery office and went around to investigate. I looked through the window and saw two men crouched down underneath the desk. I called on them to throw up their hands and as they rose up, thinking they might shoot me, I fired at them through the window. One of them cried out and then both ran to the rear of the building. I fired three more shots to attract attention and when the officers came we found Graff at the rear of the building, shot through the stomach."

Graff was formerly an employee of the brewery but a month ago he quit. He has since been tending bar in the Wallace hotel. The only thing found in the office near where the two men were seen was a box containing a number of packs of playing cards.

## Will Carry Contraband of War.

San Francisco, Oct. 10.—Contraband of war is to be carried by the Japanese steamer America Maru when she sails from this port for the Orient. The vessel will go armed to her hatch compartments with freight, the most of which will be carried at the risk of the Japanese government.

Material to make powder in large quantities will be included in the cargo of the steamer and it is also stated that she will carry a large shipment of steel. If the steamer Tokai, now at Seattle, cannot carry the sections of the torpedo boats that are said to be now on their way from the east, the American Maru may be called upon to carry part of the shipment.

## Chinese Buying Provisions.

Shanghai, Oct. 10.—Chinese government officials are reported to be purchasing here foreign provisions, which are to be shipped to the Tien Tsin. The purpose for which the provisions are being purchased is unknown. Well informed Chinese express the opinion that they are intended for the Russian army. A telegram from Kwangsi, in southern China, says that Chinese troops have defeated a large body of rebels at Loehengshien after a three days' fight. The Boxer movement is reported to be spreading in the northern provinces.

## Inventor Henry A. Gouge Dead.

New York, Oct. 10.—Henry A. Gouge, well known as an inventor of apparatus for heating railroad coaches is dead at his home in New Rochelle, New York. He was a close friend of the late James G. Blaine when he accompanied on many speaking tours.

## ISLAND OF GUAM LAWS.

Capt. Kidston Makes Complaint  
Of Their Administration.

San Francisco, Oct. 10.—Capt. William Kidston, of the Western Commercial company arrived here from the Japanese liner America Maru en route to Washington, where he goes to make complaint of the manner in which the laws are administered in the island of Guam.

Capt. Kidston has represented the Western Commercial company on the island of Guam for the past two years and he states that trade has been greatly hampered by the arbitrary laws enacted by the naval government.

## BAD FREIGHT WRECK.

Freight Cars Piled Fifty Feet  
High on Northern Pacific.

Missoula, Mont., Oct. 10.—One of the worst freight wrecks which has occurred on the Rocky mountain division of the Northern Pacific in many years, from the standpoint of delayed traffic, took place at an early hour this morning about five miles east of Garrison, Mont. Freight cars, loaded with export shipments for the Orient, were piled 50 feet high and the wreckage of two trains is scattered along the track for a considerable distance. Traffic was brought to a complete standstill and no trains were able to pass the scene of the wreck for 18 hours. One of the train crew, Fireman Bowman, of an extra eastbound freight, was instantly killed and two other trainmen were hurt, though not seriously.

The accident was due to a mistake in constraining the orders on the part of the engineer of the east bound freight. He had orders to meet three sections of No. 53 freight, westbound, on the siding at Big Bend. The third section had passed the extra ahead of the original second section. As the number of the engine of this second section corresponded to the engine supposed to be pulling the third section, as given in the orders, the extra freight engineer cut. The extra met the original second section in a deep cut, while both

## DOWIE PRAISES ROOSEVELT.

John Alexander Declares that  
Parker is a Prodigal Son.

Chicago, Oct. 9.—Apostolic denunciation of the Democratic party, its principles, its candidate for president and its individual adherents and praise for President Roosevelt and his party were thundered by John Alexander Dowie at Zion City today in the first official message delivered by the "first high priest on earth."

To an audience of 5,000 persons, the first apostle condemned Democrats as "the scum of the earth," and instructed his thousands of followers to vote for Roosevelt as the "grandest man of the hour."

With the sermon came the announcement of the "Theocratic party," promulgated by the general overseer to overthrow government "of the people, for the people and by the people," replacing it by a divine system of administration that is later to control this country and finally the whole earth, wiping out the republics, kingdoms and other present governmental forms.

"A vote for the Democratic party is a vote for the Democrats," shouted Dowie, "and a vote for the Democratic party is a vote for the brewer and distiller."

"Parker is a prodigal son. He comes back after eating the swine husks of these silverites for eight years and because of his return he immediately wants to be made boss of the whole ranch. He is not pledged to the gold platform. He merely has permitted himself to say that the country is committed to that financial plank. He still is the prodigal son, but in disguise."

All the Zionites vociferously promised to vote as Dowie requested.

## THE CZAREVITCH

Has Performed the First Patriotic  
Duty of His Life.

New York, Oct. 10.—The czarevitch performed at Reval on Sunday the first patriotic duty of his life, says a Herald dispatch from St. Petersburg. He consisted in his having journeyed with the emperor and empress to inspect the fleet before its departure.

The presence of the heir to the throne caused exhibitions of enthusiasm among the personnel of the fleet from the admiral down to the cabin boys, while the presence of the young empress served to complete the happiness of every one.

## Disorce Evil Discussed.

Boston, Oct. 9.—Great crowds went to Trinity church today to hear the archbishop of Canterbury preach, and to the church of the Advent, where a mass meeting in the interest of upholding the sanctity of the marriage bond was addressed by several well known leaders in the Episcopal church. Right Rev. William C. Doan, D.D., bishop of Albany and chairman of the interdenominational committee of churches which is endeavoring to secure conformity regarding the remarriage of persons who have been divorced. He quoted from the marriage ritual of the prayer book to show that nothing but death could sever those who have been united in holy matrimony and said: "I think it is time that the canons of the church agreed with the prayer book."

Rev. Dr. W. W. Webb of Noshita, Wis., said:

"There have been 60,000 divorces in the United States in the past year. Signs are not wanting that the people are realizing that the divorce evil must be checked."

## Fight at an Oregon Dance.

Albany, Or., Oct. 9.—Word reached here today that while attending a dance at Clark's Mill, 25 miles east of Albany, a quarrel arose between William Fitzwalter and Jesse McKinney. Fitzwalter wounded McKinney, and Dennis Taylor, by stabbing them. Both men are seriously but not fatally hurt. Fitzwalter escaped.

## To Call Out Italian Reserves.

Rome, Oct. 9.—It is asserted that the government has made all preparations to call out 70,000 more reserves, Premier Giolitti wishing to have a strong contingent of troops throughout Italy in order to quell any attempts at disorder that may be made by the extreme parties.

The war office has ordered all officers on vacation to return immediately to their regiments. Notice is also given that there will be no more holiday leaves.

## Delegate to the Philippines.

Rome, Oct. 9.—Archbishop Agius, papal delegate to the Philippine islands, left Rome today for the United States and the Philippines. He was accompanied to the station by Archbishop Chapelle and Father Soragna, holding New Orleans, a number of Filipino students, several prominent clergymen and laymen and other notable people. Count Sottocaval will go with the archbishop to the Philippines.

## BOUND, GAGGED, AND LEFT TO DIE

Rejected Lover Captures Successful  
Suitor, Carries Him to the  
Woods, Binding Him to Tree.

## SUFFERED GREAT CRUELITIES.

Four Days He Lingered There, and  
When Rescued Was Almost  
Dead.

Portland, Or., Oct. 9.—Out of spite, it is thought, and evidently in order to put Mr. Kelley of Kelso, Wash., out of the way so as to prevent his marrying a young woman who had refused the attentions of a less successful suitor, Kelly was seized, gagged and buckled, bound by wire to a tree in a dense wood, and abandoned to die for a period of four days from Monday until Friday last when he was discovered and released. Saturday the young woman who preferred for Kelley nearly caused his death, procured a marriage license and late the same day the couple was married.

Kelley is almost a physical wreck, but from the scraps of story which he has given in intervals of consciousness it would appear that last Monday he started from the home of a friend to go to Kelso en route to Kalama, Wash., the county seat to procure a marriage license. On the way he was seized, bound and blindfolded by two persons, one of whom was disguised as a woman. He was then strapped to the back of a horse and taken to the woods where he was bound to the tree and compelled to suffer unmentionable cruelties.

Thursday a note was found on the door post of one of Kelley's friends, stating the man's predicament and whereabouts and his friend at once proceeded to the place and released him.

The perpetrator of the crime is said to be a man who has for several months endeavored to force his attentions upon the young woman. Every effort is being made to apprehend this man both by the sheriff of Lewis county in which the outrage was committed and by Kelley's friends. The whole town is intensely excited, and it is generally thought if the fellow is taken he will be lynched.

Kelley has lived in the community for more than a year and is well thought of.

## KEATS' "HYPERION."

British Museum Acquires Manuscript of Famous Poem.

New York, Oct. 10.—It is announced, says a Times dispatch from London, that the British museum has acquired the original manuscript of Keats' "Hyperion." The interest and value of this manuscript is greatly enhanced because it exhibits the poet in the act of revising, adding to, cancelling and metamorphosing, thus displaying a near approach to the glow of original composition.

## Archbp. of Canterbury Preaches

Boston, Oct. 9.—The archbishop of Canterbury today preached to the largest congregation that has attended a regular service at Trinity church since the days when the eloquence of the late Phillips Brooks was a feature of the religious world. He said:

"You in the United States are face to face with problems bewildering in their greatness and perplexity. A Christian man has never before now in the world's history had to deal with such a gigantic transfer to its own shores of people from other lands; people of other creeds and beliefs and different races, in different stages of civilization, who have got to be assimilated and combined and nationalized, and that speedily if harm and confusion are not to ensue."

## THEOLOGICAL SEMINARIES.

Have Not Solved One Important  
Religious Problem in 50 Years.

Chicago, Oct. 9.—Not a single religious problem of any importance has been solved by the theological seminaries of the United States in 50 years. The churches are too much occupied with denominational questions to direct their attention to them. The solution of these problems must come from our great universities.

President Harper of the University of Chicago, in addressing the students today, set forth in these words his opinion of the status of religious institutions.

Dr. Harper offered a curriculum and plans for a university which should

embody his ideals of religious training, saying:

"The work of the university which undertakes this will include provisions for lectures, correspondence and reading courses for the students. Biblical history and literature, religion, ethics, philosophy and science also would be included in the curriculum."

"The study will not be restricted to the theory. The university will constitute itself a laboratory in which practical work will be gone into."

## People Are for Leopold.

Berlin, Oct. 9.—A popular voice against the endeavor to displace Prince Leopold from the regency was raised today in Lieppe at a public meeting held in Lieppe, which was attended by 1,000 subjects from all parts of the principality.

A large number of speakers had vigorously supported the position of the government, the temper of the assembly was shown in the adoption of a resolution saying the convocation regarded attempts to contest the decree of the regency as manifest in the emperor's telegram in reply to the Schaumburg government's protest as an unwarranted and deplorable attack upon the autonomy and sovereignty of Lieppe and urging that the diet take a firm stand in favor of Prince Leopold.

To prove that devotion and loyalty to the interest of Lieppe did not conflict with fealty to the empire the meeting closed with cheers for Emperor William as well as Prince Leopold.

## Bishop of Great Falls Installed.

Missoula, Mont., Oct. 9.—With impressive services and with all the ceremonial of the Catholic ritual, in the presence of a distinguished gathering of church dignitaries, Rev. Mathias Clement Lenthain of Dubuque, Iowa, was today installed bishop of the newly created diocese of Great Falls. Those present from outside the state were Archbishop Christie of Oregon, Bishop Odea of Seattle, Bishop Olorieux of Boise, Idaho, and Bishop Shanley of North Dakota. The new bishop was escorted in a princely procession from his home to St. Ann's cathedral, where an immense crowd greeted him. Later a banquet was served.

## Confidence in Kuropatkin.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 10, 7:40 a. m.—Commenting upon the order of the day issued by Gen. Kuropatkin on Sunday the Novaya expressed unqualified confidence in that commander and says:

"This is the man who at the beginning of the war said, 'Patience, patience, and again patience.' We have waited in obedience for his words. Now the time has come to turn southward. Advance now will be no idle word. Kuropatkin is going through to save his comrades at Port Arthur, though he may have to defeat four opposing armies to do so. But our backs are to the wall. It is not nature to desire Russian troops to retire."

## SIX MEN SUFFOCATED.

By Coal Gas in Tunnel Under  
St. Clair River.

Port Huron Mich., Oct. 9.—Six employees of the Grand Trunk railway were suffocated by coal gas today in the St. Clair tunnel, which runs under the St. Clair river from Port Huron to Sarnia, Ontario.

A coal train broke in two while passing through the tunnel and three of the train crew were suffocated while part of the train lay stalled in the tunnel.

The engineer pulled out with his engine, but returned and lost his life in an endeavor to push the stalled cars back to safety. Superintendent A. S. Begg and another man perished in attempts to go to the rescue of the others. The dead:

A. S. Begg, Port Huron, superintendent of terminals.

Engineer John Coleman, Port Huron.

Conductor Simpson, Sarnia, Ont.

Conductor Smith, Sarnia, Ont.

Brakeman McGrath, Sarnia.

Fireman Fred Forester, with great presence of mind, jumped into the partly filled water tank of the engine, while there was enough air to preserve his life, although he is in a serious condition tonight. Forester was in the tank nearly two hours before he was rescued, and his escape is little short of miraculous.

## GIGANTIC DRUG SWINDLE.

New York Polles Think They  
Have Dropped on to One.

New York, Oct. 9.—The New York police are convinced that they have dug up a gigantic drug swindle by the arrest of several men in this city. The arrests

were made on information that well known proprietary medicines were being counterfeited and sold as genuine and the authorities asserted that the investigation is not complete.

Drugs seized at the apartment of Howard E. Wooten today, it is said, are valued at \$10,000. Wooten is one of the men under arrest. The others are S. B. Minden, Manville Thomas, Charles S. Horst, Charles F. Risley and Walter S. Rocky. It is asserted by local detectives that slips were found in the places raided giving the names of 5,000 druggists throughout the country to whom dangerous mixtures made in New York were sold. It is said that the most important find in the raids was the circular sent out to druggists and containing the code by which they could order the preparations. It is alleged by the police that preparations made by the best known chemical firms in Europe were counterfeited. In circulars discovered was the statement:

"All these goods are genuine, in original packages and unopened."

The price list showed that the drugs in the list were being sold at from 15 to 50 per cent below the usual selling price.

## King Peter Anointed.

Zicha, Servia, Oct. 9.—The anointing of King Peter was performed here with great ceremony this morning. At 9 o'clock amid the pealing of bells, the king in full coronation robes, preceded by the police that preparations made by the best known chemical firms in Europe were counterfeited. The king was then conducted to the altar and partook of the communion, afterward returning to the throne, where he resumed his royal emblems. The metropolitan then invoked God's blessing and the ceremony terminated with the signing of an anthem, the king taking the cross to kiss as he left the church.

## Stalwarts May Withdraw.

Milwaukee, Oct. 8.—The Herald tomorrow will say that a meeting of the executive committee of the "National Republican" (Stalwart) state central committee will be held within a day or two to consider the advisability as to whether or not the Stalwarts state ticket shall be withdrawn. The action of the national committee in recognizing the LaFollette to the extent of asking that faction to arrange for a meeting at which Senator Fairbanks is to deliver a speech has complicated the political situation and is said to be the cause for considering the new step.

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
