## UNION CITY SCHOOL AFFAIRS

Proposition to Introduce Manual Training Discussed by Board.

## CONSOLIDATION DISCUSSION

In High School Auditorium—Program For Organ Recital Monday Night—U. P. Ry. Will Pay Judgments.

Ogden, Feb. 2.—The board of education held a lengthy session last evening. Among the matters to come up for consideration was the report that critics had been made concerning the conduct of some of the high school students especially the girls, who have been very indiscreet in some of their actions. It was decided to give these girls some good advice and to use every influence to persuade them to be more careful of their conduct in the future.

Supt. Allison reported that in the grammar grades there are now 150 more pupils than there were last year. Also that out of a class of 40 grade pupils graduated, 50 had gone to the High school to continue their studies along the higher branches of learning.

The proposed amendments to the state school laws were considered by the board.

The matter of establishing a manual training department in at least one of the schools was discussed at length and referred to the teachers and finance committees to investigate, also the establishing of a domestic science department at the High school.

Prof. Coop appeared before the board in behalf of Dr. Kingsbury of Salt Lake, who desired the use of the high school auditorium for a discussion of the proposition to consolidate the Agricultural college and the University of Utah. The request was granted.

COMPLETED RAILROAD CONTRACT. Warren L. Wattis who has been at Raton, New Mexico for more than a year past in charge of the Utah Construction company's work in building 110 miles of railroad for the St. Louis, Rocky Mountain & Pacific railroad, has returned to Ogden to spend a short time with his family and friends and will then go to Huntington, Ind., to look after another big contract of grade work secured by the construction company. The piece of work just completed extends from Des Moines, New Mexico to the Utah-Creek line from 200 to 700 men and many teams were employed on the work which it is estimated cost about \$500,000. Mr. Wattis has enjoyed good health and is pleased to return again to Utah for a short stay.

U. P. RY. WILL PAY JUDGMENTS. The Union Pacific Railroad company has decided to pay the judgment en-

forced against it in the Second district court in the case of O'Leary and Call. To the former \$10,000 will be paid and in the latter \$8,000. The cases were tried some months ago and the railroad company appealed from the decision, but has now agreed to pay for the plaintiffs that the judgments will be paid.

SUIT FOR DIVORCE. Suit has been filed in the Second district court by Mary Farr against Leon Farr, asking for a decree of divorce. The couple were married at Salt Lake City April 15, 1898. It is alleged that the defendant has neglected to provide for plaintiff for more than a year. A decree of divorce, permanent alimony and costs of suit are prayed for.

FUGITIVE RUN DOWN BY POLICE. Sheriff Sebring received a telegram last evening from the chief of police at Spokane, Washington, informing him of the arrest of a man named J. M. Donahue, who is wanted in Ogden for passing a worthless draft for \$100 on Rosenthal, the clothing dealer. Sheriff Sebring has been on the search for Donahue for several months, but could get no trace of him, although he had sent a good description of him to all parts of the country. He was traveling through Utah and the northwest for an agent of a manufacturer and in his work called on Rosenthal, to whom he sold a large bill of goods, then asked him to cash a \$100 draft, which he did, but when he returned to him dis-honored. The matter was referred to the sheriff, who communicated with the house for whom he had been working and received the reply that he had sold his samples and returned to his money. Requisition papers will be presented to Gov. Cutler for the return of the prisoner to the state for punishment and the deputy sheriff Wilson will go to Spokane for him. It is also reported that he is wanted in Salt Lake City, Pocatello and Grand Junction for similar offenses.

THE MARLBOROUGHS SETTLE DIFFERENCES.

London, Feb. 1.—An authoritative statement embodying what the family desires to say on the case of the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough was given out tonight. It follows:

The differences between the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough have been settled privately. The children will arrive at Sunderland house today and the duchess and her children will proceed to the continent early some time next week.

This statement is somewhat ambiguous owing to the possible interpretation the statement is interpreted as meaning that the duke and duchess have settled their differences and resumed the relations of husband and wife, but the family expresses desire to let it stand as it is. In well informed quarters the statement is interpreted as meaning that the duke and duchess have arranged privately a settlement of terms under which each will have the care of the children for a portion of the year. In other words, the children will now pass six months of the year with each parent. It is understood the duchess will continue to make Sunderland house her London home, while the duke will have town headquarters at a west end hotel, as he has done since Oct. 1.

King Edward has been made acquainted with the full terms of the settlement through the duke himself, who had an audience with the king at Buckingham palace today. There is great relief in royal and social circles that the Marlboroughs' affairs will not get into the courts.

The duchess has not been very well lately, and as she takes well to the cure at Montreux, France, she will, after a short sojourn in Paris, proceed to the Riviera with her sons. The duchess will have an audience with Queen Alexandra while in Paris next week, and this is one of the reasons given for her decision to go abroad now.

CHARGES AGAINST GUGGENHEIM. Washington, Feb. 1.—Hearings upon the bill to give a government guarantee to the Alaska Railroad company for its projected railroad from the head of Cordova bay to a point on the Yukon river, near Eagle, Alaska, were continued today before the senate committee on territories. There was added to the bill were trying to "corner" copper fields of Alaska, and that their plans would be interfered with if their railroad invaded the field.

White, a manufacturer, who accidentally shot himself in the head with a shotgun while hunting on the hills back of Fortworth, Ventura county, yesterday, died today in an ambulance while being conveyed from a special train to the hospital.

A BRAVE OFFICER. Globe, Ariz., Feb. 1.—A telephone message from Roosevelt this evening states that an attempt was made to lynch William B. Smith, a negro, suspected of the murder of Mr. Morris, and his child, killed through the determination of Sheriff Thompson to protect his prisoner.

The sheriff told Roosevelt at 5 o'clock this evening from Globe. A party of armed horsemen started to intercept the deputies, but the men drew their Winchester and the sheriff ordered them to return. They complied, but it is said that another attempt will be made to intercept the parties before Globe is reached.

DISASTROUS FLOODS FEARED. Victoria, B. C., Feb. 2.—James Lipson, who arrived in this city yesterday from upper British Columbia, says fears are entertained that disastrous floods, similar to the great floods of 1894 will be experienced in the Fraser river valley this spring. Mr. Lipson, who has been in the valley for many years, says that there had been a much larger snow fall than for 20 years, and if the thaw is sudden, floods will undoubtedly result.

THE SAFE IS SAFE. Attempts to Open One Containing Evidence Against Moyer Fall.

Colorado Springs, Colo., Feb. 1.—A special to the Telegraph from Cripple Creek says:

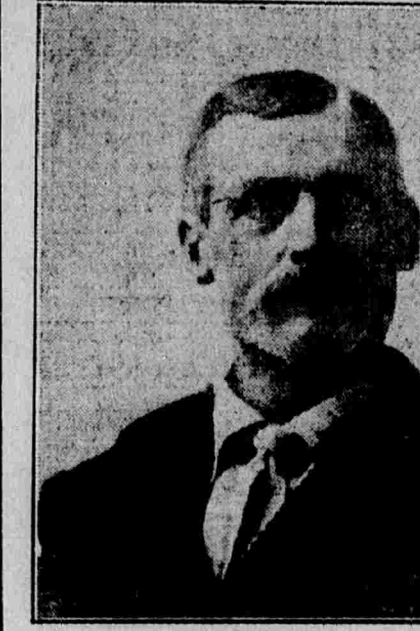

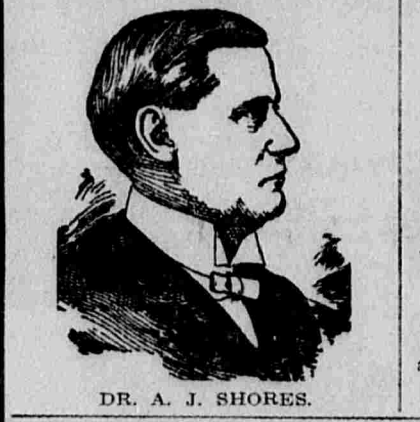
