E. T. Rogers Tells of Experiences With Moseby's Guerillas In Georgia.

NINE HOURS OF TORTURE.

Andersonville Prisoners Talk of Terrors of General Wirtz Place Where They Were Kept.

Stirring incidents of war life that read more like romance than reality are told by the Union ex-prisoners of war. Nearly every one of them can recite tales of adventure that almost put to shame the hair raising stories of the heroes of the plains.

Prominent among the visitors in Salt Lake is E. T. Rogers of Waldron, Colo. who is father-in-law to Ben Hartwick. Besides being one of the youngest men who ever entered the army he was a prisoner of war, a scout and a captain before he had reached the age of 16. For nine hours he was hung by the thumbs and his companion by the neck and both lived. He became a drummer when he was a little over 12 years old and ran away from home to help his nation in battle.

Mr. Rogers was born on May 12, 1849, nt Aurora, Ill. When the troops were recruiting in Baraboo. Wis., Mr. Rogers endeavored to join but was rejected on account of his age. Undauntil by the rebuff of the colonel, that he was too young and could not go, he followed the troops to Madison and final-ly to Mauston, the colonel of the regi-ment came across him. "I thought I told you that you could not go," said the officer. "But I am going," replied the lad. His grit appealed to the man and he was ordered to go to the quarter-master's quarters and get a uniform. As a drummer he started out 'in the Seventh United States Cavalry. Com-many C. Fourteenth Virginia and Second and Fourth South Carolina regiments, rebel troops, came along. He cut the men down and graves were dug for them. When the unconscious bodies were placed in the grave a rock hit Foster's leg and he moved. Believing that the men were alive they were taken out and laid along side of their own graves all night.

For 10 months and two weeks the men languished in prison and when Rogers was released his mind was so badly impaired that it was years before he was himself again. For 13 years he attempted to get a pension, but the war department believed that it was but the fairy tale of a suffering soldier that the man told.

He learned his identity and started for the windy city to get his affidavit to secure his pension. ready to start nome unable to find its man. As he strolled 14 and down before the gates he notice a tall, gray haired man with a soldierly bearing among the crowd. His appearance seemed famil-lar and he accosted him. Then fortune which only knocks at your door once, dawned on him. The man was Coi. Frost, who stayed over several days in Chicago to produce the affidavit. "Poor old Foster, I have not seen him since we left prison," said Mr. Rogers. "His neck was so badly wrenched that he never recovered. He is probably dead by this time. I have never been able to secure any record of him. When he was in prison his head was twisted to one side."

WOUNDED IN HEAD. Mr. Fuller was taken a prisoner after being wounded at the battle of the Wildernoss. A bullet struck his head in front of his left ear and came out in the back of his neck. While her was at Andersonville some of the prisoners adopted desperado tactles and as soon as a new prisoner appeared a number of them would strip him of everything. It was then that a munici-pality was organized among the pris-oners. A mayor was elected, as well as the prisoners were taken and tried and scaffold in the prison yard six prison-ers paid the death penalty. CAUGHT BY GUERLILAS. It was while on a scouting expedition on Aug. 18, 1553, that Mr. Rogers ex-perienced the most thrilling incident of his life. About seven miles from Dalton, Ga., Mr. Rogers with three other officers. CITY ON A LOT.

"People would not begin to believe the stories that are told of Anderson-ville prison" declared C. D. Fuller, who enlisted from the Seventh Wisconsin infantry. "When I went there the stockade was well timbered but before I left there was not a root or a blade of grass left. Just think of 32,000 people camping on a 10 acre lot one-third of camping on a 10 acre lot, one-third of which was covered with a swamp, "Just outside the prison was plenty

"My introduction to old Wirtz, the general in charge of the prison," said Mr. Smith, "was to see him kick a man to death. If a prisoner was too weak to walk this noted keeper of the prison would jump off from his horse and stamp and kick the man. It was said there that every guard who shot a prisoner was given a furlough of 30 days as a reward for his bravery. "Providence spring was the greatest Godsend I ever saw. It was along in August when the spring started up in those prison quarters where it had never been before. As soon as it start-ed the men stole a wagon box that had been left on the grounds and this as a reservoir sunk in the ground and pro-vided a drinking place."
