## COMPARATIVE ASSESSMENTS.

THE City Board of Equalization has closed its labors, and has substantially supported the Assessor in his extortinate valuations of projerty. Some few changes have been made, but they do not amount to much in the aggregate, and the Assessor will pocket, within a trifle, the big haul that he started out to make, on the per-centage allowed by the City Council. In some cases the Council has been considerate with widows and indigent persons, in others the reverse. And in one or two cases they appear to have gone beyond the limits of the

The "Liberal" organ parades a list of the rates of valuation placed on property in a number of large cities, and also the rates of taxation, and then asks how "the Mormon press" are going to "explain these facts away." Well, as far as the DESERET NEWS is concerned It will not attempt to explain any "fact away." Facts are what we are after. Some facts are furnished by the "Liberal" organ-although a doubt is cast upon them by the fact that they appear in the Tribune. But what do they show? Any enormous valuation placed on property? But out of the nine cities reported, only two placed property at its full value, while the others range from 12½ per cent to 50 per cent valuation. It is another case of stating a proposition and proving the contrary, which occurs nearly every day in the "Liberal" organ and is coming to be recognized as Tribune logic.

The facts which the Tribuse wants to explain away but cannot, are these: Property has been assessed this year at from double to ten times the figures ever placed upon it before. Multiplying the valuation from three to seven times is a common rule in the present assessor's arithmetic. The rate of taxation has been reduced but one mill over previous rates.
