

## The European Mission.

The following are from the *Milennial Star*—

"Nottingham, Nov. 27, 1874.—My visit to the north and Brother Squires' to the south of Lincolnshire have been a pleasing and encouraging experience, the Saints are brightening up, and are more firm in their efforts to serve the Lord and keep his commandments. The sick are healed through the laying on of hands, and the Saints are blest,—they not unfrequently ask for blessings at the hands of the priesthood. We and the spirit of inquiry moving among our outside acquaintances, and I do not doubt but there will be quite a number of baptisms during the coming winter. We feel just as well in the work as men can, unless they are better men. The Lord is blessing us in our labors, and clears the way for us, the Saints being embued with the spirit of the Gospel in advance of our visits. In consideration of the circumstances of the Saints, we find it unwise for two to travel in company, and we have concluded that one can accomplish as much and I sometimes think more good than two would together; and by going singly we visit the Saints, or rather they receive our visits twice in lieu of once were we to go in company. Elder Squires meets me in Nottingham every two weeks, when we spend about two days together, and then separate again for another fortnight and extend our visiting among the Saints in different directions, encouraging and strengthening them and extending our acquaintances among the people of the world, and let them learn some things from us, for they have been hearing about us from our enemies too long already."

"The greatest difficulty the Elders have to contend with, is the lamentable indifference of the people towards anything religious, they seem to have become disgusted or dissatisfied, at which I am not surprised when I take in consideration the thousand and one forms of godliness in the world, all without the power, enough to confuse or craze a philosopher. I am surprised that the whole of Christendom is not driven to infidelity; the simple plain truths of the Gospel of Jesus have been ignored, and the precepts and commandments of men been introduced instead."

"Copenhagen, Nov. 19, 1874.—I have myself attended the Conferences held in Aalborg, Aarhus, Copenhagen and Malmo. We have had reports from Christiania, Stockholm and Goteborg Conferences, and I am very thankful to say that according to the information obtained from the presiding Elders and my own observations in my travels, the work of God is still progressing and the gospel gaining its way to the honest in heart. Our meetings as a general thing are well attended and many seem desirous of investigating our doctrine. At our conference held in Copenhagen on the 1st inst. was the largest congregation of both Saints and strangers I ever witnessed in this country; peace and good order prevailed throughout, and the spirit and power of God was richly poured out upon his servants."

"During this last summer a goodly number have rendered obedience to the gospel. In Christiania, 109 have been baptised; in Copenhagen, 71; Aarhus, 65, and so in proportion in the other Conferences."

"The present prospect for preaching the Gospel is quite promising, many good and faithful missionaries have been called into the field to labor through the winter season, and with the additional force expected from Utah, we hope to be able to accomplish a good work."

"We have been forbidden by the city authorities in various places to hold meetings, but our case was brought up before 'Rigsdagen' on the 10th inst., on which occasion we had the privilege to be present. A warm and lively but very interesting debate ensued, which lasted till 6 o'clock in the evening, when the 'left' party came off triumphant with an overwhelming majority, who were in favor of the Mormons having rights with other people, for which we, as a matter of course, felt and do feel very thankful. During the discussion one of the honorable members while de-

fending our cause, went even so far as to say that the Mormon Elders had done ten times more to enlighten the people in a religious point of view than all their priests together had done, and another said he deemed it unwise and improper for the honorable representatives in 'Rigsdagen' to trouble themselves a great deal about religious matters, that he considered more particularly devolved upon the priests to look after and who ought to be able to prove to the people which was right and which was wrong. We have now a small branch in Iceland, numbering ten members, with one of their native brethren as president and latest news from there is quite favorable."

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
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
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
