WEBER COUNTY DEMOCRACY

Is Solid for Bryan—County Convention Names Delegate to State Meeting.

GAY DECEIVER IN THE TOLLS.

Ogden, June 8.—This afternoon a member of the Ogden police force will leave for Oakland, California, where he goes to bring back a young man by the name of Frank W. Fielding, who is wanted in this city upon the charge of embezzlement.

According to the information given out, Fielding came to Ogden about three months ago and represented himself as a real estate dealer. He made good appearance and showed himself to be a good fellow and made many friends wherever he went. His supply of money ran short and he went to the First National bank and secured a loan of \$500, giving as security a mortgage upon certain real estate in Salt Lake City which the bank has just learned belongs to his mother.

The young man also made the acquaintance of many young ladies of the city and finally won one in marriage. The bride, whose former name is given as Mary Carter, accompanied the young man on a trip to the northwest. In Seattle, it is stated, the young man again ran short of funds and went to a bank in that city and secured a loan in the same manner he did in this city.

Impressive Memorial Services Sunday In Both Cemeteries.

Ogden, June 8.—Simple and yet impressive were the memorial services held by the Woodmen of the World, in Ogden Sunday afternoon. For the first time in its history the day was clear and the sun was out and fully 600 members of the order took part in the procession which marched to the city cemetery where the services were held.

At 9:30 in the morning members of the committee, the degree team and officers of the order proceeded to the Mountain View cemetery where with appropriate services monuments were dedicated to Herbert Barclay and John Rhoads.

In the afternoon at 2 o'clock the procession formed at the Woodmen hall headed by a platoon of sheriff and police officers and the Hot Spring brass band and proceeded to the city cemetery where monuments were dedicated to J.
