

CONTROL OF LIQUOR TRAFFIC

Tillman Wants Bill to Allow States to Exercise Their Police Powers.

KNOX PREPARES A MEASURE.

Provides That When Intoxicants Enter a State They Shall Be Subject to Local Laws.

Washington, Dec. 18.—Senator Tillman today introduced the following resolution:

"That the committee on interstate commerce be instructed to consider and report by bill or otherwise what legislation is desirable or necessary to enable the states in the exercise of their police powers to control the commerce of liquors and all alcoholic beverages within their borders so as to aid the cause of temperance and to prevent the encroachment by the United States government of illicit dealing in the same."

Mr. Tillman said his purpose was to prevent circumvention of state prohibition laws. Said he:

"The courts have held that these laws interfere with interstate commerce. On this account I ask investigation."

Mr. Tillman said the express companies are flooding local option southern states, and the supreme court of the United States has held that such traffic cannot be interfered with because of its interstate character. He said his resolution sought to define the point at which the police power of the state begins and determine how far Congress can go in limiting the control over interstate traffic in intoxicating beverages.

A general discussion concerning the powers of states and the federal government was precipitated.

Mr. Knox suggested that the whole difficulty could be reached through a bill.

"Draw one," suggested Mr. Tillman, whereupon Mr. Knox prepared an amendment to the Wilson law.

Mr. Tillman then withdrew his resolution and offered the Knox bill, which was referred to the committee on judiciary.

The bill provides that all intoxicating liquors transported into any state or territory, or remaining therein, shall, upon arrival within the state and before or after delivery to the consignee, be subject to the laws of such state, in the same manner as though such liquors had been produced in such state or territory and shall not be exempt from any tax or duty of being introduced in original package or otherwise.

WAGES ARE TOO HIGH.

So F. B. Underwood, President of the Erie Railroad, Declares.

New York, Dec. 18.—Frederick B. Underwood, president of the Erie railroad, declared today that Samuel Gompers, head of the American Federation of Labor, was reckoning without his host when he said, as quoted, that the wages of organized labor would not have to come down along with the prices of raw materials in the present general business and financial depression.

"The inexorable law of supply and demand, which is the basis of political economy," said Mr. Underwood, "will make itself felt in the case of organized labor as well as all other branches of business. Mr. Gompers notwithstanding. In case an attempt is made to hold up the present abnormally high price of labor, when the earnings of

railroads and industrial corporations do not warrant it, the alternative will be to shut down.

"Labor has been at a premium for the last four years, and it has also been less efficient than ever before. All classes of employees have pointed to the heavy earnings, and in consequence have received their share in the share of high wages. Now a change has come. Earnings are falling off and employees will receive a lower wage. This they should do without protest, as they have the precedent that when earnings were improved their wages were advanced."

WALKER'S CLOTHES.

Blood-Stained Apparel Exhibited on a Dummy in Court.

Denver, Colo., Dec. 18.—The blood-stained garments worn by Secret Service Agent Joseph A. Walker on the morning of Nov. 3, when he was shot and killed at a coal mine near Hesperus, Colo., were exhibited on a dummy figure today to the federal grand jury, which is investigating the killing. By the location of the bullet holes in the clothing and the testimony of the doctors who held a post mortem examination of the body of Walker, the government expects to prove that Walker was shot from behind. It is understood that Dist. Atty. Earl Granston will ask for indictments against seven men, including Joseph Vanderveide, who claims to have shot Walker in self-defense, and William Mason, who was with Vanderveide at the time, on the charge of conspiracy to kill Walker.

NEW EPISCOPAL BISHOP.

New York, Dec. 18.—The Rev. Robert Lewis Padgett, pastor of the Church of the Holy Apostles in this city, was consecrated Episcopal missionary bishop of the diocese of eastern Oregon today. Bishop Daniel S. Tuttle of Missouri was the consecrating prelate. He was assisted by Bishops Potter of New York and Satterlee of Washington. D. C. Bishop Wells of Spokane was present and Bishop Scaddan of Oregon presented the candidate.

Bishop Padgett will take up his new duties in Oregon in January.

A SUCCESSFUL SAFE ROBBERY.

San Francisco, Dec. 18.—A bold safe robbery, which netted the criminals over \$500 worth of diamonds and gold, was committed last night on the premises of the New York Jewelry Manufacturing company, at 1740 Geary street. A hole was drilled through the rear wall

of the strong box and the contents of the drawer in which the valuables were kept were picked out through this, apparently with pliers.

ANTI-CIGARETTE ACT.

Illinois Supreme Court Says Can't Prohibit Sale of Pure Tobacco Ones.

Springfield, Ill., Dec. 18.—The supreme court today held that the anti-cigarette act passed this year does not prohibit the sale of cigarettes made from pure tobacco, but only those which have deleterious ingredients in them. This is because of the title, which reads, "An act to reduce the sale of cigarettes."

TAFT'S COMMENT ON FLEET.

Voyage a Good Thing but Has No International Significance.

On Steamer President Grant, by wire less via Halifax, N. S., Dec. 18.—Secretary of War Taft, who is finishing the last stage of his journey around the world on the President Grant, will probably reach New York about noon next Friday. In commenting today on the departure of the big American fleet of warships for the Pacific, the secretary said he viewed the undertaking with real satisfaction. He regarded the cruise as necessary practice and valuable as placing the men and ships under conditions approaching a war footing.

"By this cruise they will gain experience which would not be obtainable in any other way," said he. "It would be useless to spend millions of dollars in building up a navy and then withhold opportunity for practice."

Mr. Taft declared that the cruise had no international significance. He declined to discuss American politics, saying he had no possible knowledge of present political plans in the United States.

PRUSSIAN POLAND.

Henry Sienkiewicz Publishes Protest Against Its Germanization.

Paris, Dec. 18.—Henry Sienkiewicz, the Polish author, has published a protest and appeal to the intellectual world against the Germanization of Prussian Poland, especially the recent proposition made by Prince von Bismarck, the German chancellor, for the exportation land belong to Poles. Mr. Sienkiewicz acknowledges the debt the press of all countries for condemning this attempt to crush out a noble people, but he said the work of the press is not sufficient, and calls on eminent persons in science, literature and art, in addition, to express their opinion. Such a step, he declares, will show the verdict of the universal conscience.

AERONAUT'S NARROW ESCAPE.

Paris, Dec. 18.—H. Bleriot, the aeronautic expert, had another narrow escape from death today when his airplane was wrecked. The machine was traveling at the rate of about 30 miles an hour when the wires holding the wings broke and the aeroplane came to the ground with a crash. Mr. Bleriot was caught in the wreckage. He was extricated with difficulty, but it was found that he had escaped with severe bruises.

On two other occasions recently Mr. Bleriot has barely escaped serious injury, owing to an accident to his airship. On both occasions his machine was badly damaged.

CONFIRMED BY SENATE.

Washington, Dec. 18.—The senate today confirmed the nomination of Walter F. Frear to be governor of Hawaii, and of Alfred S. Hartwell and S. M. Ballou to be chief justice and associate justice respectively of that territory.

JEWS ORDERED AWAY.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 18.—A dispatch received here from Vladivostok declares that the Jews have been ordered to depart within four days. Jewish property holders, have, however, been given eight days in which to liquidate.

ALL STEEL PASSENGER CARS.

Pittsburg, Dec. 18.—More than 100 all steel passenger cars, will be in use on the Pennsylvania railroad between Pittsburg and New York shortly after Jan. 1. The cars are being built at the plant of the Pressed Steel Car company here, and are the first to replace the wooden equipment on any railroad.
