BERLIN, June 14.—The people of Berlin did not realize the extreme gravity of the Emperor's condition until the appearance of the morning extras containing the morning bulle-tin. Several ministers visited Prince Bismarck in the evening, and an informal council was held. Prince Bismarck had a long conference with the Crown Prince at Potsdam after seeing the Emperor.
