The time of the forming of the battalion was during the troublous period of the exodus from Nauvoo, and Mrs. Pixton with two helpless children was forced to drive her own team across the plains-a task whose difficult nature can be imagined from the hardship and suffering incident to the rigors of the long journey. Arriving in Salt Lake in 1848, Mrs. Pixton was here joined later by her husband, and after a time spent in the capital city-went with him to Taylorsville, which place has, with the exception of a few years spent in southern Utah, been her home. Mrs. Pixton served as president of the first Relief Society organized in Taylorsville, and in Leeds, where she later resided, was appointed to the same position. Upon her return to Taylorsville she was again made president of the Relief Society there, a position which she still holds. She has been an ardent advocate and worker in the suffrage cause and has taken prominent part in the politics of her locality her principles having a pronounced Republican bias. In February last she celebrated her 89th birthday anniversary, the occasion being made memorable by a notable gathering of friends in her honor, Notwithstanding her advanced age she retains her faculties to a remarkable degree of perfection, and still continues to take an active interest in the practical concerns in which she has long taken part.
