

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Lehi Banner: Samuel J. Taylor and company killed four deer the other day on the low hills north of town.

U. S. Marshal Brigham made a trip to Provo Wednesday, returning on the next train. On the downward journey he had with him Nephi Blamires, the Kayeville murderer who was adjudged insane. Blamires was given judgment in the insane asylum at Provo.

At the monthly meeting of the Reform school board it was decided to establish a silk industry in connection with the school, and to immediately plant out 1,000 mulberry trees, and procure silkworms. A young Japanese explained the business before the board.

At last the long, tedious and expensive trial of Captain Donovan has been followed by the anxiously awaited findings of the police commission. By them the accused is adjudged guilty on five of the seven charges preferred by Chief Pratt on September 7th last.

The two-year-old son of Francis E. Wilson of the Fourth ward, Provo, swallowed a large dose of lye Friday. Mrs. Mont. Roberts, a neighbor, promptly administered olive oil, and Doctor Noyes was sent for. It is hoped the life of the child will be saved, although it is a serious case.

Bountiful, Davis county, Clipper: Last Monday evening thieves visited the premises of John Wood and stripped his clothes line of the most valuable articles placed upon it, and the following Wednesday evening three big Thanksgiving turkeys and some chickens were taken from Mrs. William Page.

Fred B. Smith, who has been indicted for criminal libel, committed by publishing an article in the Spanish Fork Herald, of April 5th, 1895, reflecting upon the honesty, integrity and reputation of R. J. Stewart, a dentist of that place, is in town. He now lives in Chicago, but came back to plead.

Ephraim Enterprise—Little Omercy Mortensen, who was kicked by a horse about a month ago, died Tuesday morning. The child has been a great sufferer and death was a welcome relief. He had not spoken since the accident. The sorrowing parents have the sympathy of the whole community in their affliction.

BEAVER, Nov. 25—Hagstead, for shooting and killing Indian "Win" at Paogutch Lake last July, was sentenced by Judge Bartch this morning to sixteen years imprisonment with hard labor, in penitentiary.

In passing out of the court room, he said: "I'd rather be taken out and shot."

Nov. 20 marked the passing of the seventy-fifth milestone in the earthly journey of one of Utah's most noted pioneer women—Mrs. M. Isabella Horne. Mrs. Horne's name is synonymous with charity and good deeds in every part of this Territory

and from all sections thereof will spring the desire that she may yet live many years to minister unto the wants of others.

Information was received in this city Nov. 20 by relatives of the family, that Mrs. Eleanor Pauline Stevens-Wright died at Ogden at 10:35 last night. The deceased was the wife of Reuben Wright, brother of Dr. Wright of this city and the daughter of W. H. Stevens, the well known Junction city business man. The deceased was 23 years of age, and had been married about a year. She leaves a little babe, a husband and a host of friends to mourn her early departure from this life.

A private dispatch from Logan, Cache county, conveys the sad news that Mrs. Emma Lewis, of that town, departed this life last evening, Nov. 25th, after an illness of several months. Deceased is the wife of David Lewis, the well known photographer. She was an estimable, kind hearted woman. She, with her husband, was baptized into the Church in Liverpool, England, in 1880 and came to Utah the year following. She was aged 64 years at the time of her demise.

Some one who should serve a term in jail for malicious mischief, threw a large stone against and broke the plate glass in one of the front doors of the Co-op Wagon & Machine Co.'s place of business the other night. Before throwing the stone appearance would indicate the person held it in his hand and struck one of the large windows two heavy blows, as it is cracked in two places and plainly shows the marks of the stone, which, after it was thrown against the glass in the door, rebounded and was found broken into four separate pieces on the doorstep.

Mrs. T. V. Williams a well known and highly esteemed lady of Salt Lake, came to Logan a short time since to see that her daughters Mrs. Alfred and Mrs. Frank Palmer, received proper attention during their approaching confinement. Mrs. Frank Palmer gave birth to a girl on the 15th, and Mrs. Alfred Palmer to a boy on Tuesday last. On the latter date the devoted mother came down with an attack of typhoid fever complicated with lung trouble. All that medical science could suggest was done for her, but in spite of the best attention the lady died on Saturday evening.

A telegram received Nov. 20 by the family of Dr. Edlie R. Shipp brought news of the death, at Castle Dale, Emery county, of Dr. Shipp's sister, Mrs. Eliza Ann Seeley, wife of W. J. Seeley. A few days ago Mrs. Seeley met with an accident by being thrown out of a wagon. Her sister, Dr. Shipp, was telegraphed for to this city, and took the next train for Emery county.

From today's message it was learned that the injuries received in the accident were fatal. Mrs. Seeley was the mother of ten children. Her eldest son was married a day or two before the accident occurred.

It has been decided to expend about

\$8,000 in enlarging and repairing the old Tabernacle. About \$3,000 of the amount was subscribed last Sunday afternoon and workmen have commenced tearing up the flooring. The front will be removed and a decorated modern front will be built of brick, iron and stone. There will be side doors similar to those in front, only smaller. The enlarging will be at the rear end which will be carried back a considerable distance, giving a seating capacity of 1,500 persons more. It is expected the work will be completed by January 20th, in time for the next quarterly conference.

There were exhibited at the NEWS editorial rooms Nov. 25 some very fine specimens of Davis county almonds, both of the hard and soft shell variety. They were raised by Professor Metcalf, of the Deaf and Dumb Institute, and in size and flavor are as good as those which are imported. It is generally known that almonds are successfully raised at St. George and other southern Utah points but it will perhaps be surprising to many NEWS readers to know that they flourish as far north as Davis county. Professor Metcalf this year got seventy-five pounds from two trees, which demonstrates that they can be made a profitable crop in Utah.

Funeral services over the remains of the late Eleanor Pauline Stevens Wright were held in the Second ward meeting house, Ogden, at 2 p. m. Nov. 22nd, Bishop Robert McQuarrie presiding. Opening prayer was offered Elder Joseph Hall. Remarks were made by Elder Robert F. Neesen and Bishop McQuarrie. The latter read a letter from Elder F. D. Richards, expressing his regret at not being able to be present. The letter was full of good words for the departed and sympathy for the bereaved relatives. Elder C. F. Middleton pronounced the benediction. About one thousand persons viewed the remains. The grave was dedicated by Bishop McQuarrie.

John Lloyd, a young man of about 22 years of age, came down from Montana, where he has been working most of the time for the past few years, to visit his relatives and friends here and in Wellsville. He arrived about six weeks ago, and within a week of his arrival was stricken down with typhoid fever at the residence of his sister, Mrs. J. A. Hendrickson, in this city and he died yesterday morning. His early death will be mourned by a host of relatives and friends. His remains were taken to Wellsville, the home of the family today. The funeral services were held in the Wellsville meeting house, and his body was buried by the side of his father's, who died about one year ago.
