

## STREET FIGHT IN GREAT FALLS

Jealousy Said to Have Started It  
But It Resulted in Death  
Of One Man.

**TWO OTHERS WERE WOUNDED**

A Hungarian Accosted Three Roumanians, and Began Trouble by Boasting of Provess.

Great Falls, Mont., July 4.—About 3 o'clock this morning a street fight that appears to have had its origin in jealousy, resulted in the death of one man, the serious wounding of another, and the slight wounding of a third.

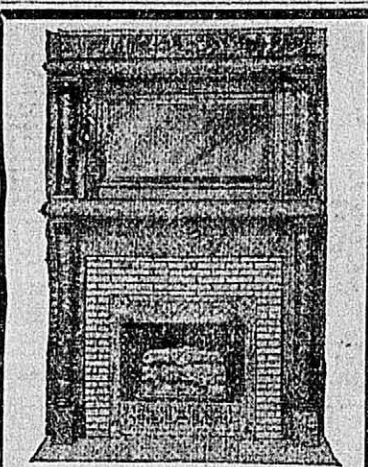
Three Roumanians were accosted on the street by Michael Papp, a Hungarian, with the remark that one Hungarian could easily lick the three. The others sneered at his remark, and he drew a knife and stabbed John Nalgio, one of the trio, in the back. The wound is serious, but not necessarily fatal. Immediately Papp started on the run for his home.

John Stole, another of the trio, hunted up a policeman and conducted Papp to his home. Papp, however, did not stop there, but ran into another room. O'Neill followed, telling him that he was under arrest. As soon as O'Neill entered the back room, which was dark, the door closed behind him. He grappled with the man and then Papp shot, sending a bullet through the lobe of O'Neill's ear and making a flesh wound above. The policeman drew his revolver and, guessing where to find him, he sent a bullet into Papp's head, killing him instantly. A coroner's inquest was held this evening and the jury held that O'Neill was the aggressor.

Back of the tragedy there is a story of jealousy and mistaken identity. Previous to coming to Great Falls, the Papps had conducted a boardinghouse at Lehigh, and a man named Tudor was the star boarder. Papp was jealous and Mrs. Papp told him about Tudor's advances. Later they moved to

## EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION.

General Sessions Will Open in Denver

This Evening.  
Denver, Colo., July 5.—The general sessions of the National Educational Association will open tonight in the Denver auditorium and it is expected that no less than 10,000 of the 20,000 persons here to attend the meeting will be present.

This morning the last day's work of the national council of education was taken up with a discussion on rural school supervision, led by Nathan C. Schaeffer, state superintendent of public instruction of Pennsylvania. Robert J. Aley of Indianapolis, John McDonald of Topeka, Kan., and Charles McKinney of Milwaukee, took part. This afternoon the council closes its sessions with a discussion of the administration of public educational systems. The departments of religious education and the education of the Indian also began their sessions today. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia university, New York, was the principal speaker before the Indian department.

## CHAS. E. RUSSELL MARRIED.

New York, July 5.—The marriage is announced today of Charles Edward Russell, the magazine writer, and Miss Teresa Hirsch, daughter of the late Andrew Jackson Hirsch, a Chicago lawyer. Miss Hirsch and her family

originally lived in Davenport, Ia., where they first met Mr. Russell when he was editor of a Chicago newspaper. Before becoming a magazine writer, Mr. Russell was city editor and managing editor at various times of several of the most prominent newspapers in New York, Chicago and San Francisco. His articles about the beef trust attracted attention and among the books he has written was "Soldiers of the Common Good."

## CALIFORNIA GIRL GETS GOLD MEDAL FOR DEVELOPMENT

New York, July 5.—After a contest which embraced all the principal cities of the world, the gold medal of the Physical Culture society of New York has been awarded to Miss Margaret Claire Edwards, of Napa, Cal., for the most perfect physical development of a girl under 17 years of age. The winner is 11 years and 2 months old, 5 feet 1/2 inch tall and weighs 106 pounds.

## LARGEST FLAG IN WORLD UNFURLED TO THE BREEZE

Pittsburg, July 5.—By far the largest flag in the world was hoisted to the breeze yesterday between the Allegheny courthouse steeple and the Frick building. It is 180 feet long, 90 feet wide, and is suspended from a two-inch steel cable which runs within the steeple and the other passing through the massive Frick building. When unfurled, the flag reaches within two stories of the ground and it is estimated that a wind of 12 miles an hour will put a pressure of 50 tons on the steel cable which holds it.

Instead of but one flag being unfurled there were 50,000 of them, as at the top of the great flag there were 50,000 smaller ones arranged so that, with the dropping of the great flag, they too, unfurled.

## RESTORED TO REASON, IS REFUSED HER CHILD

New York, July 5.—Mrs. Matilda Woolsey came east from Denver a few days ago to claim the little 4-year-old son given away by her husband while she was in the Middletown asylum temporarily deranged when the baby was born. She had been told by Supreme Court Justice Morschauer that the claim of the foster-parents was now greater than hers—her own flesh and blood not hers, but another woman's.

Mrs. Woolsey, who is a pretty, faxen-haired woman of 29, went down on her knees before Justice Morschauer and pleaded with him to give her back her boy.

While the bereaved woman pleaded, tears filled the judge's eyes and it was with difficulty that he could control his voice to render the decision that blasted her hopes. With little Clinton were his foster-parents, who at the first attempt to take him from them fought for the child as though he were their own.

On the witness stand, Mrs. Woolsey said that when she was released as cured from the asylum she was told that her little boy had died.

## "SMELTER KING" IN DIVORCE TANGLE IN CHICAGO COURT.

Chicago experienced a shock when former Mayor Dunne went into Judge Honore's court there recently and demanded that a divorce granted in 1901 to Grace B. Guggenheim, from William Guggenheim, one of the family of "smelter kings," be set aside. Judge Dunne declared that he would grant the divorce when he was on the bench but that the decree had been obtained by fraud and collusion and should be set aside. He produced affidavits purporting to show that Grace B. Guggenheim was not a legal resident of Chicago when the divorce was granted to her. She now appears as plaintiff in the motion to annul the decree.

## UNIQUE POSITION OF NEW YORK SCHOOL TEACHER

New York, July 5.—Miss Elizabeth McGilvray enjoys the distinction of being the only public school teacher in New York who has been appointed on the roof of a hospital, and also that of being the first teacher ever appointed in the city to take charge of a class which is under medical care all the time, and who range in age from 6 to 15 years.

The new school is on the roof of the Vanderbilt clinic, at the corner of Fifty-ninth street and Amsterdam avenue, in the Red Cross consumptive camp, which was opened there in December. There are enrolled in the school about 20 pupils, and their studies embrace, as near as possible, the work of the public school, and when children who are suffering from disease leave school to enter the camp they take up their studies where they left off when

they left the schoolroom. In this school there will be no vacations. One of the innovations of the school is that the little sufferers immediately after dinner shall lay down and rest for from one to two hours and sleep as much as possible. Another is the rule that all studying shall be done in a reclining position, the big canvas lounging chairs, with which the camp is equipped, being utilized for this purpose.
