TWO OTHERS WERE WOUNDED

A Hungarian Accosted Three Roumanians, and Began Trouble by Boasting of Prowess.

Great Falls, Mont., July 4 .- About 3 o'clock this morning a street fight that appears to have had its origin in jealousy, resulted in the death of one man, the serious wounding of another and the slight wounding of Policeman O'Neill, who shot the man who was killed.

Three Roumanians were accosted on the street by Michael Papp, a Hungarjan, with the remark that one Hungarian, with the remark that one Hingar-ian could easily lick the three. The others sneered at his remark, and he drew a knife and stabbed John Nalgo, one of the trio, in the back. The wound is sectious, but not necessarily fatal. Immediately Papp started on the run to big bome.

Immediately Papp started on the run for his home. Join Stoic, another of the trio, hunt-ed up a policeman and conducted Fa-trolman M. J. O'Nell to the home of Papp with the intention of having him arrosted. When they entered, Papp pit Stoic, but upon seeing the police-man, ran into another rooom. O'Nell followed, telling him that he was under greet. As soon as O'Neill entered the back room, which was dark, the door closed behind him. He grappied with the man and then Papp shot, sending a biljet through the lobe of O'Nell ear and making a flesh wound above.
