road, a corporation subsidiary to the international, is being built as fast as men can construct it. The San Pe-dro road is doing the work by con-tract with the Topels Valley which decided that this method was preferable to getting together an organization and buying the necessary equiptment for so short a line. The road is to be comshort a line. The road is to be com-picted and ready for operation to the smaller site by May 1, when the actual work of indiding the simeller can be begun. Meanwhile the site is being prepared. The pipe line that will overy the water to the smaller is in-stalled. It is a 14-inch pipe and the line is one mile in length. Hence preparation was made to provide for the hundreds of smelter men and their families that will have to be housed. This has been done by the Toosle Improvement com-pany, which has bought about 260 acres of ground within the city limits. This Its western bound-

any is about a quarter of a mile from the courthouse. One hundred and sev-only acros of the subdivision has been stated and it is believed that here will grow up a great commercial oity. Upon this trast the Tooele Valley road has located its only station between the San Pedro and the smelter. The commany is so sure that its tract will be company is so sure that its tract will be thickly inhabited that it has secured a franchise from the city council ema franchise from the city council em-powering it to construct and operate for 60 years a waterworks system for the exclusive use of its subdivision. It has also purchased ample water to sup-ply the domestic and commercial needs of a city of 10,000 inhubitants. The old fushioned method of private sale will not be employed on this tract. Instead there will be an suction sale of lots on April 16 with special trains to

instead there will be an abaction sale of lots on April 18 with spocial trains to bring to the ground all those who de-alre to buy or who think they might like to buy. As the planning and execution of all the phases of the entire enterprise has been entrusted to such an extent such to Montana men, it is believed that

there will be a large attendance from that state. Special railroad rates have been arranged for and there is now a tentative discussion of a special train from Butte which will run through solid from Bute to Tooele. In any event there will be at least one special train over the San Pedro which will leave immediately after the arrival of the Butte train on the morning of April 15.
