THE OLYMPIAN GAMES.

Committee In Charge Has Started Out to Raise \$100,000.

Chicago, March 15,-The committee in charge of the movment to bring the Olympian games to Chicago in 1904 has decided that the first step in that di-rection must be the raising of \$100,000, which is half the estimated expense of the undertaking. Nothing further will be done in the matter until that sum is assured. It is believed it can be se-cured from four of the interests which will be chiefly benefited financially by the games if secured. These interests are the railroads which center here, the surface, and elevated roads, the ho-tels and the larger business houses of Chicago Chicago.

As soon as the entire sum is pledged steps will be taken toward securing the games but not until then, as the committee wants the money in sight before committing itself in any way. is proposed to raise the remainder of the required \$200,000 by private or public subscriptions
