Mr. Carey then moved a *nolle prosequi* in the case of Kligen Smith, which was entered, when his examination on the side of the prosecution commenced.

Odgen Junction, July 26—

Last Saturday a terrible and fatal accident happened at Willard Bingham's saw mill, about thirty-five miles from this city. His boys had just purchased a shot gun, and they were on a lead of lumber examining the lock, which was loose. One of the boys got off the hind end of the wagon, and the gun, which was loaded, was accidentally discharged and the contents entered the side of Erastus Bingham, a fine little fellow ten years of age. He lingered till this morning, when he died. His friends are plunged into great grief by the sudden calamity.

Early this morning Mr. Thomas Burdett's wife, who is subject to fits, followed by temporary derangement, went into the garden leaving her baby with her husband. As she was gone a long time he became alarmed and went out to seek for her. Hunting through the garden he could find no trace of her. He continued his search, but up to the hour of our going to press nothing has been heard of her whereabouts. Mr. Burdett has searched the spot near the Ogden river, where his wife was discovered once before, and where she had strayed while afflicted, but can find no trace of her.

Later.—We stop the press to say that Mr. Burdett found his wife this afternoon, about six miles out, by the Utah Central track, within two or three feet of the line. She is still crazy, but is quite tractable.

Odgen Junction, July 27—

At a county convention, held in the City Hall, to-day, John Van Cott, Lewis S. Hills and John Rowberry were nominated for Commissioners to locate University Lands, and Lorenzo Snow for member of the Legislative Council for Weber and Box Elder counties.
