Pittsburgh, Oct. 28.—Senator Quay has filed suit in the U. S. Circuit Court against the Pittsburg "Post" and other papers throughout the state that published the facsimile of the Secretary's certificate of deposit yesterday. One of the first actions will be to get that a civil action will be brought against the Post for \$100,000 damages, and criminal suits entered against the paper and its editors, and also against Senator Quay of the Democratic committee.

BRIGGS AND THE DIRECTORS.**
The Board Stand by the Interests of the Doctor.

New York, Oct. 28.—The directors of the New York Theological Seminary are continuing to give testimony in the committee on the case regarding the disappearance of Prof. Briggs' appointment to a chair in the seminary. In view of the extensive correspondence received by the committee all present refused to divulge the proceedings, it is understood that the directors of the seminary are as culpable as any others.

When the conference adjourned last night the proceedings of the two days' session was made public. The directors took the stand that they were independent and alienated to Professor Briggs, whose election to the chair of Biblical theology was vetoed by the general assembly. The two days' session had been adjourned at the close of talk, but the matter is still unsettled, with indications unfavorable to a near settlement. The directors added that they were not guilty of the misrepresentation of the meeting of the board of 1870, whereby the appointments of professors were to be considered by the general assembly.

In view of this return of the election of additional members of the faculty, not so appointments to new departments of professors already in existence, the directors committee then examined and adopted a resolution declaring that the General Assembly had always regarded said professor as occupying one of the most important seats in the directorate. After deliberation the directors returned another resolution, declaring that the board, without examining into the facts, without investigating into the conduct of the professor, had entirely repudiated the holding of a trial, and it should be given to Prof. Briggs or properly arranged. Thus the affair ended.

What Ecclesiastical Officers Do.
