My letter to the NEWS, "How to atilize our Dry Lands," has caused some inquiry; and I would answer by stating, that the "vigor" grass has shown liself could to the task of living and growing vigorously on even the dryest lands, where there was a suffici-ency of molsture in the land during April or May, August or Septembar to cause the seed to vegetate so that it once gets a start it continues to pro-pagate and spread itself, both from seeds and roots.
