FRISCO. SALOON AND HOTEL BURNED.

 SALOON AND HOTEL BURNED.
 Destructive Blaze in Beavers Mining Camp—Centrifugal Separator Repairs.

 Frisco, Beaver Co., Feb. 10.—The citizens of Frisco were aroused about 2 a. m. yesterday morning by the cry of "fire," which broke out in the sa-loon belonging to Loue Martin. Ad-jacent to it stood the St. James hotel, leased by L. D. Joseph. The bed rooms upstairs were all occupied, and it was a very close call that the occu-pants escaped alive. None of the beas ore bedding were saved. The kitchen utensils were all destroyed. Furniture in the lower rooms was mostly saved. company to fill a mission to Canada, but was called home when Johnston's army came to Utab. The athletic association of the university holds a con-tract with Kraenzlein running until June, but in view of he unsettied condition of athletics at the college the executive com-mittee of the athletic board voed to re-lease he coach from his obligations.
