THOSE "MORMON ALIENS."

One Who Knew Them in Native Land Tells of Their Coming to Utah.

To the Editor

To the Editor, Thave recently read articles in the Sait Lake Tribune and in the "News," concerning "Mormon allens," who were to be deported. The persons mentioned are Lars A. Fristrup, wife und child. The writer is well ac-quainted with the family named, as immense tract of salt deposits, the existence of which has only been generally known for the past few months, is now the subject of special investigation. well as with some of the circumstances connected with their coming to this yountry. The statements that they were induced by missionaries to emivery large, as the deposit covers an area of 30 miles long by about 15 miles wide, and goes to a depth of between four and eight feet. Last October, when the prospect of a Western Pacific railroad presented a possibility of marketing the sait, people began to file placer claims. Over 200 of such claims wer filed in Tooele, but

were induced by missionaries to emi-grate are contrary to the truth. As far back as June, 1901, I knew the Fristrups, and was importuned by the head of the family to lend him money to emigrate to Utah. Other missionaries were similarly approach-ed. On another occasion, while Frist-rup was looking over an album con-taining the photos of various Utah and Idaho men who had labored in the Scandinavian mission. Fristrup was struck with the idea that it would be a good thing to ask each of those persons, 200 in number, to contribute \$1 each, which would bring him \$200, a sum sufficient to pay for the emisuch claims wer filed in Tooele, but the state government and the Utah congressional delegation have been at work on the case, in the hope of sav-ing the deposit to the state, having it surveyed, and then selling it to the highest bidders, when its value is fully known for the benefit of the university. The legal question involved was whether or not the salt deposit would be ranked as "saline land" and thus become part of the university land grant, or if it would be classed as a mineral deposit and consequently be open for entry as other mining claims. SCARE AT FILLMORE.

Smallpox Not so Bad as Was First Re-ported Here.

Seey. John De Grey Dixon of the state land board said this morning when questioned as to the effort being made to affirm the state's title to the sait, that the government was now preparing to let bids for the survey of the sait deposit. "This fact alone," he said, "would seem to give us a prefer-ential claim to them. The bids will be advertised in a few days, and after the survey is made, it is the purpose of the state land board to appraise the lands, after a careful investigation and offer them for sale to the highest bidder. I do not think the placer claims already located will be allowed to stand." Mr. Dixon has received a letter from Senator Sutherland on the subject, but declined to give out its contents as he had not referred it to the board for action. He said, however, that it seemed to confirm the state's title. Supreme Court of United States Passes **On Idaho Sheep Case.**

Washington, D. C., Feb. 4 .-- Justice McKenna in the supreme court today affirmed the decision of the court be low in the Idaho sheep cases, sustaining the constitutionality of the statute ing the constitutionality of the statute of Idaho. This statute is in effect that it is not lawful for any person owning or having charge of sheep to herd them on lands or possessory claims of other persons or to herd or permit them to graze within two miles of dwelling house of owner of pos-sessory claim.
