The Jews and Cremation.

Jewish scholars of modern times have not neglected the subject, and in the discussions which have been published from time to time opinions seem to be evenly divided. If there be any preponderance of authority in any direction it is certainly not against cremation. The question of immortality has clearly no right to be introduced into the discussion. Whether the body slowly crumble away into dust or be more quickly resolved by quicklime, as was frequently the case in the days of body-snatchers, or be almost instantaneously turned into ashes, is clearly a mater of degree. The real question is as to our feelings with regard to the various methods. The practice of thousands of years has mitigated the borrors of interment, while the novelty of cremation gives a shock to the feelings at the suddennes of resolving our bodies into their primordial elements. Cremation is a matter of feeling, not of religion. At the same time a matter of feeling is so far a matter of religion that it is irreligious to hurt any one's feelings unnecessarily. If science declares emphatically in favor of cremation, we shall learn to resign ourselves to it. Whether the dust returns to earth by slow decay or by the speedy action of fire is not of moment from a religious point of view, provided we are convinced that the "spirit returns onto God who gave it."—Jewish Chronicie.



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
