RURAL DELIVERY ROUTES.

Mail for Slaterville, Fair-West, Harrisville, Wilson and West Weber to be delivered.

System to be inaugurated December 1—City Council Proceedings—Two Couples Marry.

What will be good news to the people of the county especially, was received by Postmaster Thomas Davis in a communication from the office of the first assistant postmaster general, instructing him to establish three rural delivery routes in Weber county, to commence Dec. 1, 1932, with three carriers at a salary of \$600.

The carriers will be required to make a trip around their route each day throughout the year excepting Sundays. They will carry a supply of newspapers, stamps, postal cards, and stamped envelopes and may act as agents for the people wanting to send money orders. They will leave the postoffice at Ogden every morning at 9:45 and return to the same place at 6:30 p. m. The carriers will not be permitted to act as solicitors, agents or salesmen for any business, but may, if they choose, carry any express packages, etc., and may act as agents for newspaper publishers and accept and collect subscriptions.

The people along the routes will be expected to place mail boxes in front of their homes in a convenient place so that the carrier can drop their mail in the box, and the carriers will carry a strict account of the number of pieces of mail delivered and received. Upon the establishment of the rural delivery routes, the postoffice at Slaterville, Fair-West, Harrisville, Wilson and West Weber will be closed.

The three routes established are as follows:

Route No. 1 begins at the postoffice and goes west six miles; thence northwesterly to county limits, then the route proceeds to Wilson, West Weber and Garland. The total length of the route is 22.5 miles; the area covered, 25 square miles; the population served, 1,100; there are 248 houses on the route.

Route No. 2 starts from the Ogden postoffice, goes to Plain City and returns by another road. The total length is 23 miles; the area covered, 19 square miles; the population served, 550, number of houses on the route, 161. The third route goes by way of North Ogden and View to a point near the Hot Springs and returns by way of Fair West. The total length is 24.5 miles; area covered, 19 square miles; population served, 900; number of houses on the route, 191.

Three iron collection boxes will be placed on the routes as follows: Route 1, at intersection of roads at the center of west line of section 25, near the sugar factory. On route 2, at intersection of roads in center of section 16, at A. McFarland's place. On route 3, at intersection at center of south line of section 29.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

A communication from the mayor was submitted in relation to the proposed paving extension on Washington avenue. He favored eliminating intersections from the proposed extension as the city's proportion of the total cost would be greater than the city's financial condition would warrant. The matter was referred to the law committee.

The Oregon Short Line Railroad company petitioned for a franchise to build a connecting track, to the line of the Southern Pacific railway, on Seventeenth street. The matter was referred to the committee on railroads.
