Mail for Sisterville, Farr-West, Harrisville, Wilson and West Weber to be Delivered.

System to be Inaugurated December 1 -City Council Proceedings-Two

Couples Marry.

What will be good news to the people of the county especially, was received by Postmaster Thomas Davis in a com munication from the office of the first assistant postmaster general, instruct-ing him to establish three rural delivery routes in Weber county, to commence Dec. 1, 1902, with three carriers at salary of \$600. The carriers will be required to make

trip around their route each day aroughout the year excepting Sundays. They will carry a supply of postage stamps, postal cards, and stamped envelopes and may act as agents for the ple wanting to send money orde They will leave the postoffice at Ogder every morning at 9:45 and return to the same place at 6:30 p. m. The carriers will not be permitted to act as solicitors, agents or salesmen for any busi-ness, but may, if they choose, carry any express packages, etc., and may act as agents for newspaper publishers and accept and collect subscriptions. The people along the routes will be

expected to place iron mail boxes in front of their homes in a convenient place so that the carrier can drop their mail in the box, and the carriers will keep a strict account of the number of pieces of mail delivered and received, Upon the establishment of the rural delivery routes, the postoffice at Slater ville, Farr West, Harrisville, Wilson

and West Weber will be closed. The three routes established are as

Route No. 1 begins at the postoffice and goes west six miles; thence north-westerly to county limits, then the route proceeds to Wilson, West Weber and Garland. The total length of the route is 23.5 miles; the area covered, 26 equare miles; the population served, 1,-26 there are 246 houses on the route. Route No. 2 starts from the Ogden postoffice, goes to Plain City and re-turns by another road. The total length is 23 miles; area covered, 18 square miles; population served, 850. number of houses on the route, 161.

The third route goes by way of North Ogden and View to a point near the Hot Springs and returns by way of Farr West. The total length is 24.35 miles; area covered, 22 square miles' population served, 900; number of houses on the route, 191. population

Three iron collection boxes will be placed on the routes as follows: oute 1, at intersection of roads at the center of west line of section 25, near the sugar factory. On route 2, at in-tersection of roads in center of section 6, at A. McFarland's place. On route at intersection at center of south line f section 29.
