LISBON, 10.-Government has ordered quarantine to be enforced on all arrivals by way of Gibraltar.

LONDON, 10.-A sensation has been caused by the publication of Lord Wolseley's dispatches denouncing the evacuation of Soudan. He warns the government that on the withdrawal from Dongola the whole province will ald the tongue of an angel describe be given up to anarchy and will revert from civilization to barbarism. The withdrawal, he says, will not avert the struggle. The Mahdijin a few years will attack Egypt. The years of internal trouble in Egypt have been a burden on Her Majesty's resources, and the best policy in both a military and financial point of view would be to attack El Mahdi at Khartoum.

LONDON, 10.-The Queen has summoned the Marquis of Hartington, Secretary of State for War, to Balmoral Castle. It is not known whether he is summoned as the representative of Gladstone, or if he will be invited to form a new Cabinet. Hartington seems in no hurry to comply to the summons and has not yet started for Scotland.

A private deputation of Conservative Members of Parliament waited on Sir Stafford Northcote and the Marquis of Salisbury to-day and urged them to refuse office. The Marquis of Salisbury stated that if the Queen .called them they must form a government. He would support Northcote as Premier, and he expected that the Queen's demands would place Sir Stafford in that position.




