

INCOME TAX AMENDMENT

By Vote of 317 to 14 House
Passes Senate Joint
Resolution.

DEMOCRATS VOTED FOR IT.

Burden of Democratic Speeches Was
That It Was Simply Case of Stealing
Democratic Thunder.

Washington, July 12.—By the decisive vote of 317 to 14, more than the necessary two-thirds, the house today passed the senate joint resolution providing for the submission of the income tax question to the states. The negative votes were all cast by Republicans. The resolution now goes to the president for his signature.

The debate lasted about four hours. Chairman Payne of the committee on ways and means voiced the sentiment that such a tax would make "a nation of liars."

DEMOCRATIC CLAIM.

The burden of the Democratic speeches was that it was simply a case of stealing Democratic thunder, although some of the remarks on that side incidentally touched upon the tariff and the corporation tax, with no little amount of castigation of the Republicans for failing to do so.

After agreeing to take a vote today at 4 o'clock on the joint resolution presenting an amendment on the resolution authorizing the levying of an income tax, regardless of apportionment among the several states, the house proceeded to discuss the proposition. "I believe it tends to make a nation of liars," declared Chairman Payne in connection with a statement that he was utterly opposed to such a tax in times of peace. He believed it was the most difficult of enforcement and the hardest to collect. "It is, in a word," he said, "a tax upon the incomes of honest men and an exemption to some extent to the rascals."

He hoped it would never be invoked. "We welcome the conversion of the Republican party to another Democratic principle," was the comment of Mr. Clark of Missouri, the minority leader, who got roundly applauded from his side of the chamber for his utterance. An income tax, he maintained, was a Democratic principle. "One by one," he went on to say, "the Republicans have adopted our platform." He concluded by expressing himself in favor of increasing the amount of exemption above \$5,000.

This led into a colloquy with Mr. Burke of Pennsylvania.

"How far above \$5,000, and why?" Mr. Burke asked.

"I would fix whatever figure I did fix for the public good," sharply answered Mr. Clark.

Upon being pressed to be more specific Mr. Clark said he would want to think the matter over.

Declaring that if the question had been put to him, Mr. Clayton of Alabama said he would exempt the poor man, who was least able to bear the burdens of government, and would tax the multimillionaires and thereby make the idle rich pay something to the support of the federal government.

cratic applause, "get your Willie Waldorf Astors who have millions of income and live abroad. In the light, I don't know of a scab on Skibo or Skeebie, or whatever you call it."

"Hobo," a voice on the Republican side was heard to say.

"Of scorn," said Mr. James of Kentucky, in favoring the resolution, "a government whose taxing power provides that Lazarus shall share his crumbs, but that Dives must not give up his riches."

Mr. James quoted from an ante-election speech in which Mr. Taft favored a graduated income tax and expressed the view that perhaps a change in the personnel of the United States supreme court might affect a reversal of its former opinion holding the income tax unconstitutional. "You do not know Mr. Bryan for that," he said, facing the Republican side. "You said he was assailing the honor and integrity of the supreme court, yet the man you elevated to the loftiest position in the nation virtually repeated the very same words that for 12 years the Democratic party in every platform had uttered."

While favoring the amendment, Mr. Henry (Texas) expressed the fear that it would suffer defeat if submitted to the legislatures. He desired to have

the proposition submitted to constitutional conventions, Mr. Bartlett (Ga.) shared in this view.

In a fiery speech in support of an income tax, Mr. Robinson (Ark.) arraigned the Republicans for, as he charged, "robbing the people" before the last presidential election. He defended William J. Bryan, declaring that he stood head and shoulders above any other man in public life today.

"There are men here," he remarked, "who owe William J. Bryan an apology."

Others supporting the resolution were Harrison (N. Y.), Kiefer (Ohio), Hull (Tenn.), Miller (Kas.), Sim (Tenn.), Bartholdt (Mo.), Byrd (Mass.), Richardson (Ala.), Sulzer (N. Y.), Goldfogle (N. Y.), DeArmond (Mo.), Healin (Ala.), Cox (Ind.), Sharp (Ohio), Rucker (Mo.), Dies (Texas), Cole (Ohio), Hobson (Ala.), Aldrich (Ark.) and others. Messrs. Hill (Conn.) and Pickett (Iowa).

Mr. Henry (Texas) vainly sought to offer an amendment providing for the submission of the question through constitutional conventions, but the speaker ruled that under the agreement for a vote no amendment was in order. From succeeded in forcing a roll call. The vote resulted: Yeas 185, nays 143, sustaining the speaker.

VOTE ON RESOLUTION.

The vote on the resolution resulted 317 to 14. The Democrats voted solidly for the resolution, but the following Republicans voted against it: Allen (Me.), Barfield, Dalzell, McCreary and Wheeler (Pa.), Fordney (Mich.), Gardner, McCall and Weeks (Mass.), Hill and Johnston (Conn.) and Southwick (N. Y.), and Calderhead (Kas.).

The house at 5:33 p. m. adjourned until Thursday.

OBSERVATION STATION ON MOUNT WHITNEY

San Francisco, July 12.—A meteorological and astronomical observation station at an altitude of about 14,000 feet is to be erected on Mount Whitney by the Smithsonian institute. The work of preparing the trail up the mountain over which the material will be transported by pack mules, is already under way. It is expected that the station, which will be temporary, will be completed by the first of September, when Prof. W. W. Campbell and Prof. Abbott of the Lick observatory, will go to Mount Whitney to make spectroscopic observations and data will also be gathered on atmospheric conditions at that altitude.

Prof. Alexander G. McAdie, in charge of the local weather bureau, stated yesterday that while the proposed station on Mt. Whitney will be merely a shelter, it is hoped that it will be the beginning of an observatory in time will contribute materially to the solution of the problems of the upper air.

SUFFRAGETTES REFUSE TO PAY FINE, GO TO JAIL

London, July 12.—Fifteen of the suffragettes who, in the course of their raid on the house of commons June 29, indulged in the breaking of windows with stones hidden in paper parcels, went to prison for a month today rather than pay the fines inflicted by Sir Albert de Reuten of the Bow street police court.

Sir Albert commented severely on the lamentable spectacle of respectable women in the dock on charges usually associated with juvenile hoodlums. The suffragettes, most of whom made short speeches, claimed that their offenses were purely political. The course of Premier Asquith in refusing to accept their petition, they said, had made militant action necessary, and if the women were in the wrong, they refused to give undertakings for their good behavior. They declined to pay the fines imposed and were sentenced each to three weeks in prison.
