Ogden, Feb. 15 .- The spread of contagious diseases in Ogden is the cause of much concern among the authorities, and every effort is to be made to stop further spread of contagion, There is some cause for so much sickness, and the state board of health has decided to take a hand in determining what is causing it and to assist in overcoming the same. Dr. Clark of the state board came to Ogden yes-terday and with Councilman Sumuel Thomas is making a careful inspection of the various icchouses, and the city water supply. The water and ice will be out to a test and if not pure will be condemned. A week ago Dr. Beatty came to Ogden and met with all the health officers, giving them proper in-structions in their duties. This morn-ing be came to Ogden again to further investigate the health conditions, and give nstructions to the school teachers and others. While there have been but few deaths from the contagion, if it is not overcome at once, it will become more malignant. Drs. Beatty and Clark advise the people to use every precaution to see that the water they use, also the milk is pure. By proper care being exercised the conditions will rapidly improve.

absented themselves from school on account of sickness. Out of an enrollment of 4,810 for the past month, the average daily attend-ance has been 4,277. The percentage of punctuality was 98.7 per cent. The finance committee reported cash on hand \$40,519.17. Kansas Cadet Leads His Class at West Point-Taft Presents Diplomas.

Point—Taft Presents Diplomas. West Point, N. Y., Feb. 14.—With plain words of advice as to their fu-ture duties—t headvantages and hard-ships of an army career—Secretary of War Taft today presented diplomas to the 108 members of the graduating class of the United States Military academy. The secretary impressed upon the young men who were com-missioned as second lieutenants in the various branches of the army that the military service must ever be subor-dinate to the civil government, and that it was their serious duty "to keeep their mouths shut and obey orders." In time of national danger, he de-clared, the soldier has his opportunity to achieve a great degree of fame, but in the every-day life of army routine there is much that seems tedious and ixsome. irksome

there is much that seems tedious and irksome. Secretary Taft upon his atrival was met by Col. Hugh L. Scott, superintend-ent of the academy. A troop of col-ored cavalry served as an escort to Col. Scott's quarters, where the luncheon was served. A salute of 17 guns was fired in honor of the secretary, who after the graduation ex-ercises in Memorial hall made thorough inspection of the buildings and grounds.
