

Taft Administration Will Enforce The Sherman Anti Trust Law Vigorously.

SAYS ATTY ... GEN. WICKERSHAM

In Answer to Crics of "Let Us Have Peace," Declares Price of Peace is Obedience to the Law.

New York, April 30 .- The Sherman anti-trust law will be enforced by the Taft administration. Rebates will be prevented so far as possible. The work of the Roosevelt regime in this direction will be carried forward with vigor, though by different methods.

Atty.-Gen. Wickersham announced this tonight in an address before the New York bar.

"You all know," said Mr. Wickersham, "that the attitude of a very large part of the business community towards some of the laws enaoted by Congress was, prior to six or seven years ago one of indifference when not ne of hostility.

one of hostility. "There was a prevailing impression that many of the laws dealing with economic subjects had been passed to be pointed to with pride, rather than to be enforced. Then there came a rude awakening. The last administration awakening.
