The cavalryman has moved forward almost on the pommel of his saddle se that the horseless soldier may seat himself behind on the horse's haunches The rescued soldier lifts his feet up on the horse's back so that they will not interfere with the action of the steed's hind legs, and, grasping his rescuer's shoulders, he is ready to be carried out of range of the Japanese sharpshooters. If the rescued soldier had been wounded he would be laid face downward

across the shoulders, and the rider would hold him with one hand while galloping away.

One of the new methods of producing oxygen consists in distilling lique-fled air, the different boiling points of the oxygen and nitrogen making it comparatively easy to separate the two gases. The curious property of condensing gases that charcoal possesses has suggested to Dr. James Dewar an even simpler process, and he finds that cheap oxygen may be had by making the charcoal absorb air at a low temperacharcoal absorb air at a low temperature and then expelling the oxygen by slowly raising the temperature. At 165 degrees C. below zero—20 degrees above the liquefying point of air—the charcoal becomes saturated with air in ten minutes, storing up six liters for every fifty grammes. On gently heating, the first liter of gas given off contains 18 per cent of oxygen, the second 39 per cent, the third 53 per cent, the fourth 72 per cent, the fifth 79 per cent, and the sixth 84 per cent. and the sixth 84 per cent.

One of the wonders of Scarborough, Eng., is its caterpiller farm, a walled-in half-acre on which rare species of moths and butterflies are reared with as much care as the poultryman gives to his prize fowls. Each female lays sev-eral hundred eggs. The feeding cater-pillars are confined in muslin bags or "sleeves," and these are moved from "sleeves," and these are moved from place to place on the trees. The eggs, caterpillars and mature insects have considerable market value.
