

RECEIVED a circular this morning, which announces a grand meeting of the Howe family to be held at Harmony Grove, South Freeport, Maine, on Thursday, 31st of August, 1871. Hon. Joseph Howe, Secretary of State of the Dominion of Canada, will deliver an oration on the occasion. The circular gives brief sketches of some of the American ancestors of the different stocks or branches of the Howe family, and the purpose of awakening interest, and to direct the enquiries of their descendants. Every one of Howe descent is requested to bring to the family gathering, or forward by mail to Elias Howe, 1.5, Court street, Boston, or to Mr. J. H. Temple, Framingham, Mass., his own complete family record, and that of his immediate ancestors.
