LOPSIDED REPORT IN CITY FINANCE

Treasurer Snyder Shows All But The Debits in His January Statement.

COUNCILMEN SEEK FIGURES.

They Have Tried for Some Time to Find Out the Condition of the Treasury, But Have Failed.

A report of the city's finances for the month of January was filed with the recorder yesterday by Treasurer Snyder. The actual condition of the treasury can not be gleaned from the figures, as no mention is made of outstanding warrants. Members of the council, headed by Mr. Hall, have endeavored to get a statement in which the warrants would be included, but thus far have not been successful. From the office of the auditor came the following figures as the condition of various funds:

The outstanding warrants at the first of the month amounted to \$51,985.55. This would make the real balance in the funds amount to only \$75,802.84.

The various revenue funds, had warrants drawn against them, which are now outstanding for the following amounts: Contingent fund, \$27,855.10; water supply, \$3,814.48; water works, \$5,770.02; streets and sidewalks, \$5,204.14; sewer and drains, \$6,097.19; public library, \$1,580.92. Three of the revenue funds are reported as already overdrawn. The amount of the outstanding warrants makes them still further overdrawn. The water supply fund would be overdrawn \$19,754.73; the streets and sidewalks fund, \$6,177.13; sewer and drains, \$8,341.58.

The water supply and irrigation fund, which is reported as having a balance of \$389.46, is really overdrawn \$2,425.02, when the outstanding warrants of \$3,814.48 are taken into consideration. The contingent fund, richest of all the funds instead of having a balance of \$127,734.08 cash on hand, has against it warrants amounting to \$27,855.10, leaving it with only \$99,878.98. The balance in the city's revenue funds is given as \$129,901.49, made up as follows: Contingent fund, \$127,734.08; water supply, \$3,814.48; water works, \$5,770.02; streets and sidewalks, \$5,204.14; sewer and drains, \$6,097.19; public library, \$1,580.92. The balance in the special funds are reported as having a total balance on hand of \$222,452.02, which makes a total of funds in the hands of the city of \$352,353.52.

BECK THE FATHER OF THE DRAMATIC SKETCH

Executives of Orpheum Circuit Here Today—An Interesting Chat With "Wally" Young.

Martin Beck, head of the Orpheum circuit, who, with others of the Orpheum executive staff, arrives in this city this afternoon, talked interestingly to Wally Young the other day. "Wally" is remembered as a newspaperman of this city, and particularly as a collaborator with the late Race Whitney in the Press club show of two years ago, "The Old Heddon." He is now a member of the Hearst forces. In a fun game, Beck, who is a native of the "Wally" has this to say in a recent issue of the San Francisco Examiner:

"It is only a few years since the dramatic sketch was a thing unknown in vaudeville. In next year we will give them Bernard Shaw and the year after that of Ibsen. And they will like it."

The square, blocky jaws of Martin Beck, together with a snarl, the little black eyes of him danced. He leaned forward in his chair, his face clenched tensely. His whole attitude said: "We'll make them like it."

"The growth of vaudeville, the vaudeville, is the direct result of a continual effort on our part to elevate the standard.
