 cer, accompanied with cries of order, order.
 Mr. MOREHEAD, (whig) of N. C., moved the res-
 olution authorizing the printing 10,000 copies of
 Seward's report for the use of the exploration to the Great
 Salt Lake for the use of the House. The yeas and
 nays were ordered.

 cordingly announces this House stands adjourned sine
