Although I am not a lawyer, neither have I had an over abundance of schooling, I am compelled to believe that there has not been a sufficient amount of local discretion allowed in this matter of changes, and members of our ter of changes, and members of our school patrons are of the opinion that the Territorial Superintendent has no more right to instruct County Superintendents to have those changes made than he has to issue an edict to the people ordering them to throw their hard carned means into the fire. I submit that the full into the fire. I admit that the full price for the books which we are to receive in exchange is not demanded, but where is the necessity of it. There is one thing sure; some per-son will make a good deal of money out of this business, and the worst of it is, this money to the tune of a good many hundreds of dollars will have to come out of the pockets of ye toliers, and the worst of it is those tollers already have a sufficiency of burdens.
