Deceased was born at American Fork, Utah, March 22nd, 1836. She leaves four children and a husband. She called them all around her bed and gave them good counsel, and then went to sleep in peace, in full faith of a glorious resurrection.

OBITUARY.

WILLIAM OPENSHAW, born September 3d, 1785, died of old age, at his residence, Santaquin, January 21st, 1883, aged 87 years, 4 months and 18 days. He was a man of remarkable health, experiencing but very little sickness during his life, being very temperate in all his habits, and it may be truly said of him like the ancients: "That he gathered up his feet in bed and gave up the ghost," for he had no suffering, the Lamp of Life naturally burning out.

He was baptized in 1840, in Bolton, Lancashire, England, and in 1841 was ordained an Elder. It had been previously revealed to him that he would be called to that office. He labored to the best of his ability to warn the inhabitants of the surrounding country of the restoration of the Gospel through the Prophet Joseph Smith, despising the shame of the world for the Gospel's sake. He was First Counselor to the President of the Brightest-fold Branch from the time of its organization in 1841, to the time of his emigrating to Utah in 1858. When he had farewelled to the land of his birth, his neighbors and employees, not of his faith, bore testimony to his consistent and exemplary life, saying, that if his life as a Latter-day Saint was the fruits of "Mormonism" there must be something good therein. In the year 1850 he was camped on the banks of the Missouri River, on his sixty-first birthday, preparing to cross the Plains with the handcarriers. He with his family traveled in Captain Martin's company, arriving in Salt Lake City, Nov. 30th. In all his privations, his faith and trust in God grew brighter, he realizing that God had protected himself and family whilst crossing the mountains in the snow.

He arrived in Santaquin in December of the same year, where he resided until his death. He was a member of the High Priests Quorum. He died as he lived, a consistent Latter-day Saint, surrounded by all his children, who are all members of the Church. He leaves an aged wife, four sons and three daughters, sixty living grandchildren, and and three great-grandchildren. His remains were followed to the grave by 20 vehicles with mourners, and a large number on foot, testifying to the sympathy felt by the Ward. May he sleep in peace till the morning of the first resurrection.—[Com.]

THE CHANGE IN SCHOOL BOOKS.

KAYSVILLE, U. T., January 25th, 1883.

Editor Deseret News:

During the last few days there has arisen quite a discussion in this remote corner of Uncle Sam's domain. The discussion is in consequence of some changes that have been made and others in contemplation, namely, the changing of our popular school books—Wilson's series for the Independent series. It seems to a great many persons that this change is unnecessary and an actual waste of means. In the first place, we find but few individuals of mature age but will readily express themselves in favor of the Wilson's Readers and Spellers; and again we are told we must change our old and highly-appreciated Davis' Arithmetic for—(something, well, I don't know what).

Now, Mr. Editor, we are also told by our local trustees that unless those changes are made the districts so refusing will not be allowed their proportion of the territorial school fund. I fail to see anything verging on independence in this for surely the word independent is synonymous with that of independence. It seems to me that in the matter of education our school authorities at least should allow their constituents the first great fundamental principal of our glorious Constitution, freedom, independence and free thought and action, so long as they interfere with no one's rights.

We are told that the changes are in accordance with the Territorial Statutes; so far so good, but have the honorable gentlemen composing the Territorial Legislature the right to say the Territorial Superintendent of Schools must cut off his right hand? Not much; neither do I think the honorable gentlemen have any right to say that the whole community shall discard that which has stood by them for years, and that too which they were perfectly satisfied with. Although I am not a lawyer, neither have I had an over abundance of schooling, I am compelled to believe that there has not been a sufficient amount of local discretion allowed in this matter of changes, and members of our school patrons are of the opinion that the Territorial Superintendent has no more right to instruct County Superintendents to have those changes made than he has to issue an edict to the people ordering them to throw their hard earned means into the fire. I admit that the full price for the books which we are to receive in exchange is not demanded, but where is the necessity of it. There is one thing sure; some person will make a good deal of money out of this business, and the worst of it is, this money to the tune of a good many hundreds of dollars will have to come out of the pockets of ye tollers, and the worst of it is those tollers already have a sufficiency of burdens.
