MAMMOTH COPPERMINE.—We were shown a fine specimen of ore from this mine, this morning, which is situated in Tintic District and owned by English capitalists. The general assay of ore taken from this mine is found to be 130 of copper and 20 ounces of gold to the ton.

The company have also struck a limited quantity of malachite, a very valuable kind of ore. Mr. F. Fowler is mining engineer and general manager for the company, and by his skill and energy the mine is being rapidly developed.

DAMAGE BY THE STORM.—About four o'clock yesterday afternoon, while the thunderstorm was raging, the west end of a house in the Twentieth Ward, belonging to Mr. John Anderson, shoemaker, of First South Street, was struck by lightning.

The electric fluid first struck the chimney, cracking it and loosening a number of bricks, and in its descent divided, part going inside and part outside. On the exterior an upper window was partially blown out, and the interior of the house was completely destroyed.

A portion of the roof of the house, of which the upper part of the gable is composed, and the plastering of a deep furrow in the concrete wall, from the level downwards.

Inside a hole was made in the ceiling of the room and part of the wood work was torn to pieces, and thrown in every direction. Several lights of glass of two south windows were also smashed.

Fortunately the west portion of the house, where the lightning struck, was unoccupied, a family who occupied it having moved out only a few days previous. The striking of the building was accompanied by a terrific and loud report, which greatly frightened a woman who was in the east part of the building, and its only occupant at the time.

Considerable damage was also done by the heavy rain to the bench water ditch, all the labor expended by Mark Lindsay and two different sets of men that day, being entirely undone. The thunder and lightning, the hail and the rain yesterday, were very severe while they lasted.

THE EXCURSION ON THE LAKE.—We wrote somewhat elaborately concerning the inaugural lake excursion of the season, of Saturday, May 11th, in connection with which we gave a description of the steamer of Messrs. H. S. Jacobs & Co., City of Corvair, and as the excursion of last Saturday was similar in general features to the previous one, a lengthy allusion to it would probably appear superfluous. In every respect, however, save perhaps numerically, the party numbering only about seventy, it was a decided success.

The scenery met with on a trip of this kind is certainly more impressive than that which greets the eye in nearly every part of the Territory, with the exception of the being enhanced by the addition of the fine expanse of blueish green water, from which the surrounding ranges of huge, sombre, lacry-looking mountains seem to shoot abruptly upwards on nearly every side.

The elements met strikingly manifest in the scenery of and surrounding the Salt Lake are hugeness, grandeur and strength, or, in fact, the general constituents of an imposing and sublime love to view such scenes, and there is certainly much in them that is calculated to excite admiration, mingled with a degree of wonder, in those who delight to contemplate the handwork of the God of nature.

Thus, in looking at the west end of that freshness, bloom, and general beauty, of an observable in the more modified pictures of nature in lesser altitudes and milder climates, the dryness of the atmosphere in this locality robbing the mountain sides of their clothing of fresh, verdant vegetation, and which would otherwise cover their naked abruptness. Yet here and there can be seen diminutive, bright, verdant spots, where bubbling springs burst forth and ripple down the steep declivities, making plants, shrubs and trees come out on the mountain slopes, like families on either side the sombre faces. Quite a number of cases could be seen from the deck of the vessel as she steamed along from Lake side to Lake Point and returned, on Saturday.

On the steamer arriving at Lake Point, or Clinton's Landing, as it is sometimes called, the excursionists disembarked and enjoyed an hour's ramble on the beach. At this place Dr. Clinton has built a substantial rock house, a sign hanging from a post in front of which informs the portion of the public traveling that way that it is the Lake House, where man and beast can rest and be refreshed. A short distance from this point lies, in a snug corner, the settlement of E. T., and away to the northwest, over an arm of the lake, can be seen the prosperous town of Grantsville.

During the trip music was supplied to those who wished to indulge in dancing by the Tenth Ward quadrille band. An excellent dinner was served on board, and

Mr. Jacobs was assiduous in his attentions to the comfort and enjoyment of every body around him. The excursion was combined with the unexpected conditions of the weather, conducted to make the excursion an enjoyable affair.

We had the pleasure of meeting on board the City of Corvair Mr. Davis, of Philadelphia, who is on a pleasure tour through the west, and is accompanied by his wife and son, the latter an intelligent and agreeable young gentleman of about eighteen summers. Mr. Davis was one of the earliest members of the Philadelphia Republican League, which is probably one of the most powerful political organizations in the country. It will be remembered that during the late internecine war this association raised, equipped and sent to the field, at its own expense, seventeen regiments to aid in quelling the rebellion. Mr. D. and his son were both present, and were picked up by the way a valuable fund of information concerning every locality they visit. They are devoting a liberal share of their attention to the resources, geography, etc., of Utah. We were also gratified to meet with Mr. Patch and his daughter, Mr. P. is from California, having been a resident of that State for twenty years. He is well known to some of Utah's oldest and most respected settlers. He has been falling for some time. His purpose, with his daughter, remaining here during the summer, is in hopes that his stay will be the means of improving his health. We also made the acquaintance of Dr. Foster, late of Toledo, Ohio, and a graduate of the New York Medical College, who purposes settling down in this country, providing he is sufficiently encouraged in the matter to make it an object. We should think that tourists and sight-seers generally would be glad of the opportunity thus afforded of spending a few pleasant hours in sailing on the far-famed Salt Lake.
