PHIPPS FAMILY TROUBLES.

His Friends and Attorneys Are
Patching Them Up.

Pittsburg, June 20.—The Post tomor-
row will say:
Through friends it was learned today
that the attorneys representing Mr.
Mrs. Lawrence Cowles Phipps have
agreed upon the great portion of an
agreement that will end the litigation
pending in the Denver courts. Mrs.
Phipps must surrender all title to the
Pittsburg mansion, "Grand View," the
Denver home and the title to the
United States Steel corporation gold 5
per cent bonds aggregating \$500,000, all
of which property was transferred to
her by her husband, the late Mr. Phipps,
three months ago. The agreement also
provides that the Phipps family will
also retain in her service, while she
has the children, the nurses and maids
who aided the husband in regaining
support of his wife. If the agree-
ment is effected in all other details the
matter of separation or divorce will be
settled. In addition to this matter,
Mr. Phipps, so it is said, presented
an affidavit to the effect that his dis-
avowal did not contain a charge of
infidelity.

NEW BICYCLE ORDINANCE.

The following amendment to the bicy-
cle ordinance, which increases the re-
stricted district, was passed by the
council upon recommendation of the
wheelmen of this city.

"It shall be unlawful for any person
to ride any bicycle, tricycle, velocipede
or other riding machine or vehicle upon
any sidewalk within the district
bounded by the exterior lines of the
following streets:

"Commencing at the northwest cor-
ner of the intersection of Third West
and Second North streets, south on the
west side of Third West street to the
south side of Sixth South street, east
on the south side of Sixth South street
to West Temple street, north to Seventh
South, east to Ninth, north to Sixth
South, east to the east side of Sixth
