## MUST ROLL THEIR OFFICIAL SLEEVES

City Fathers Face a Big Bundle Of Business for Tonight's Session.

MEAT ORDINANCE COMES UP.

Also the Question of the Outlet Sewer And Likewise the North Temple Conduit.

When the city council meets tonight the slaugtherhouse ordinance in regard to meat inspection will be presented for the first time. It is the most stringent ordinance regulating any industry in the city. The ordinance is the result of an investigation of these places made by the city council which revealed filth and unsanitary conditions. The ordinance covers about 20 typewritten pages and was drawn by P. J. Daly, assistant city attorney, with the as-sitance of Walter J. Frazier, city fool

inspector.

It was first proposed to have government inspection, but many of the small butchers objected saying that the expense would put them out of business. Then it was decided to establish a mutatival extern of inspection with the Then it was decided to establish a infinicipal system of inspection with the requirements of the federal inspection rules. When this was found impossible, it was decided to incorporate in the ordinance that the inspectors must be veterinary graduates of a college with a three years' course. The number of inspectors will be increased as they are needed needed.

The measure makes the violation of any section of the ordinance a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than \$50 or more than \$290 or imprisonment of not less than 30 days and not more than six menths in the city jail or both. The following are the important points in the ordinance:
License from city council.

Compliance with regulations of board of health.

No dwelling on same lot with slauga-terhouse, which must be lighted and centilated. Watertight floors and non-absorbent material are required on sides of kill-ing, dressing and cooling rooms. Employes must wear clean clothing. Hands must be disinfected before

lressing meat. Employes with tuterculosis are barr-

Implements must be sterilized. Inflation of carcasses is not allowed. Trucks, skewers and everything that ouches meat must be disinfected. Water and ice used must be clean. Feeding of hogs on refuse is forbid-

Tainted meat must not be offered for Inspector must be a veterinary sur-

eon. Tollet facilities at all slaughterhouses. Wagons must be covered and clean. Hours for slaughtering between 0:30 m. and 5:30 p. m.

Ante-mortem examination of animals for slaughter.
Condemned meat must be tanked and Condemned meat must be tanked and locked up by inspector.

Preservatives are barred.

Daily inspection reports must be made to board of health.
