Auto Hill Climbing. New York, March 19.—Plans are gradu-ally being perfected for the great auto-mobile hill climbing contest this summer up Mount Washington. In the White mountains. The main difficulty has been to get permission to use the mountain road for such a purpose. Negotlations to this end have practically been closed. The present intention is to hold the contest during the latter part of June or early in July. The start will be made near the foot of the mountain and the contest, which, will virtually be an en-durance test, will hast two days. The ma-chines, with their operators, will ren-devous at one of the hotels near the middle of the mountain, and only those vehicles that have come up to a required standard will be allowed to continue on the second and deciding day of the as-cent.
