HEAVIER DUTY ON LUMBER.

Payne Measure Declared to be Theo reticanty Correct but Many Changes Are Anticipated,

Washington, March 10 -- Chairman Payne of the ways and means countiltee is personally revising the prelim mary draft of the tariff bill, which will go to the government printing office this week. The present plan b to have this first print of the bill made without the rates of duty appearing in it. On the night before the bill is introduced the rates will be inserted and a corps of copy renders will make the final corrections. No schedule or provision within the bill is free from the possibility of being changed hetween now and the day the bill is introduced.

At the final meeting of the commit-

At the final meeting of the commit-tee at which the bill will be passed on by the Republican members every item will be reviewed. The proposition to place a duty on coffee is understood to be a matter concerning which there is much dif-forence of opinion in the committee. During its deliberations the commit-tee placed a duty on coffee, took it off ngain, and, as the bill now stands, a tax of 4 cents per pound is provided for.

## INCREASED LUMBER DUTY.

APPRAISING VALUES. To prevent the practice by which goods imported are not accessed at their full value, a provision has been incorporated making it possible for the appraiser to base the value on articles according to the American wholesale market prices in connection with the wholesale price at the point of produc-tion abroad. The provision states that in the absence of evidence regarding the foreign wholesale price, the ap-praisers may assess the ad valorem duty on a price not less than the wholesale price in this country, less the cost of transportation.
